In The Spirit

As winter turns to spring and we travel the road of faith and service together, I want to ask you how you are feeling about your own spiritual centeredness these days. I find that even when I feel overwhelmed, angry and bewildered, it is a huge help to know what tasks I should be focusing on, and why.

I find that much of the time, it is the "why" that actually takes more time to reflect on and understand than an actual task. It is fine to say, "I am doing this out of love" or "I have to do this task because it is my job" or "I will attend that event because I want to learn something," but staying energized for all that we must do invites us to go deeper than that. We must go way down where the wellspring resides. To give you an example of what I mean, the other day I have been in online conversation – actually more like debate – with MA residents who insist that sanctuary ordinances are nothing more than an invitation to crime, expense and "stolen jobs" from people they refer to as "ILLEGALS" (it's always all caps, which amounts to screaming). I have tried to respond to their angry hysteria point by point with information about immigration policy, Supreme Court rulings on the fourteenth amendment, and the perspective from public safety officials who support sanctuary cities. However, these people refuse to grant that they might be wrong or misguided. Why do I bother?

I could say, "Because I want to put information out there that may inform just one person enough to reconsider their virulent opposition." But I need to go deeper than that in order to keep my heart in the work. And so I put in my mind a refugee family and pray for them, and for all the displaced and traumatized human

beings who have lost their homes and had to flee under dangerous circumstances. I walk my neighborhood and think about all my neighbors whose hearts will break if and when friends and family members who have never done anything wrong are deported. I dream of the America I want our children to inherit and love as their own nation, and I see their faces in my mind's eye. I walk my dog and hear a variety of languages on Lynn Shore Drive and it sounds like music to my ears.

If you find that you are not able to accomplish quite as much as you used to lately, this might be why. Maybe you, like I, are having to dig deeper to find the *why* that fuels you. As we move together on the "road from greed to giving, love will guide us through the hard night." ("Love Will Guide Us") May the church be your fuel station, a place to re-charge and find wayside companionship and even joy for the journey.

The Kemenyfalva Chronicles 12 Years and 12 Pilgrims

Since 2004, our congregation has had a partnership with the Unitarian congregation in the village of Kemenyfalva located in the Transylvanian area of Romania. Transylvania, once a part of Hungary, includes many villages that reflect Hungarian ethnicity.

Prior to 2004, two UUCGL youth, Hannah Peterson and Raquel Sevilla, participated in a youth pilgrimage to Unitarian and other Transylvanian sites and visited Kemenyfalva. In the twelve years between 2004 and 2016, ten from our UUCGL congregation have also visited Kemenyfalva where they stayed in village homes and gained a first hand understanding of the roots of Unitarian religion and how a people have been able to withstand years of attacks on their beliefs and organized efforts to suppress their Hungarian identity. Our congregation has provided some assistance to the Kemenyfalva congregation and the village in meeting needs that our partner has identified. Some of these projects are: scholarships for village youth to attend high school, technical institute, and/or university, support of a summer camp for children of Kemenyfalva and other nearby villages in collaboration with two other UU congregations, subsidizing the costs of rehabilitating the parish house, and facilitating visits both to and from our two congregations.

As UUCGL Vice President Lyssa Andersson affirms, it is our people to people relationship that attaches meaning to a partner church relationship. She writes: *For me, it's all about community. When I think about what UUCGL means to me, it includes the congregation of the Unitarian Church-and their neighbors in Kemenyfalva. There's Agi and Alpar and Attila (and those are just the A's) who have laughed with me and sung hymns with me and shared their homes and farm harvestings and hearts. We are truly a global community.*

Mary Kiene- Gualtieri and her family, visited the Kemenyfalva congregation several years ago, expresses her impressions of her experience as follows: *Visiting our partner church village in Transylvania was an inspiring experience for me as well as my family. We now have first-hand knowledge of the life in this tiny community, where life is simple, the air is clean, and the welcome is warm. The people of Kemenyfalva work hard and do well for themselves, but I'm glad our church can help by providing funding for the needs of their church, and for the children who may not otherwise be able to afford boarding costs to attend the high school in another town (there is no high school in the village). I'm proud that our church community makes a difference in this little corner of the world.*

To the benefits of a broadened sense of community and understanding to be gained from joining a pilgrimage to our partner church community, can be added a deeper appreciation of our Unitarian roots. John Benson shares his thoughts about his visit and writes: *Arriving in a small Transylvanian country village, I expected stereotypes, but instead found neat little houses with furnishings, living arrangement, and food that were all surprisingly familiar. As for the people, with the exception of the very different language, I felt that I was at home with my friendly next-door neighbors, with whom I shared similar feelings and points of view. The combination of very familiar surroundings and old cities and buildings put the flow of history into a new and revealing context. And the biggest surprise of all, I came to understand clearly the simplicity, elegance, and power of Unitarian doctrine.*

Green Corner Open Space

As most of you know, I chair the Green Sanctuary Ministry Team which is celebrating “open space” this year. I also happen to be a member of the Town of Swampscott’s Open Space & Recreation Plan Committee, which updated the town’s open space plan a couple of years ago. Lynn also has a formal open space plan setting forth recreational goals and open space opportunities for the town. Both are worth reviewing and supporting.

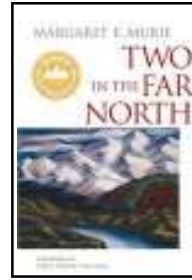
Here is an article I wrote for Swampscott’s OS&RP Committee’s Blog: *Swampscott’s Monument Area was designed by Frederick Law Olmsted, the famous 19th century American landscape architect who designed many urban parks – including New York City’s Central Park and Boston’s “Emerald Necklace.” Popularly considered the father of American landscape architecture, he advocated that, in landscape design, you “consult the genius of the place in all.” In other words, any improvements of the landscape has to pay close attention to the inherent character of the land. In our seacoast town, I believe that means enhancing our connection to the shoreline – not creating barriers to it.*

Olmsted also believed that “the perfect antidote to the stress and artificialness of urban life (and I’d add here, 21st century suburban life) was a nice stroll through a pastoral park.” For that reason, I believe he would wholeheartedly approve of the proposed Rails-to-Trails that would run through our town and create a green space where we can take a relaxing stroll and our children can safely ride their bikes, a space for use by all of the town’s residents, one that connects us and gives us space to breath. Such a green space – and not Vinnin Square – could become the “heart” of our community.

Swampscott recently revised its [Open Space & Recreation Plan](#). The plan includes a snapshot of our existing open and recreational space along with goals and a seven-year action plan designed to both enhance and protect what we have before it’s all gone. Every Town department and committee and every town resident should take the time to review and, more importantly, support its implementation.

Swampscott needs to pay attention to its open & recreational space. As we move forward – whether it be with a new housing development or a new school – perhaps we should start asking “What would Olmsted do?”
