HOPE CENTER REPORT

December's statistics for services given by the Hope Center tDuring the month of January, the Hope Center served 60 households with a total expenditure of \$3,858.75. \$3149.75 was spent to provide 64 nights of Emergency Shelter; 4 families were helped with their utility bills for a total expenditure of \$249.00; 23 families were given gas vouchers for a total expenditure of \$249.00; and 10 households were given ShopRite gift cards totaling \$245.00. Services rendered by the Hope Center's Food Pantry are as follows: 344 families were served consisting of 649 adults and 340 children. During the month of January, they distributed 15, 000 pounds of food.

The Hope Center is constantly looking for volunteers to provide the services of the organization. For example, on April 22nd, they are holding a Gift Auction which needs the following volunteers:

1) volunteers to transport the baskets from the Hope Center to Toms River High School East; 2) volunteers to sell tickets (admission and gift tickets) at the event; 3) volunteers to help set up the Gift Auction area; and 4) volunteers to help clean up the Cafetorium at High School East. If interested in volunteering for this fund raising event, please see Dave Correll, the church's liaison representative to the Hope Center.

Right now they need volunteers in the following areas: 1) in the food distribution area; and 2) to pick up surplus goods from stores that will be distributed to their clients such as bakeries, etc. If interested in volunteering for service in one of these areas, please see Dave Correll.

Did You Know....that there was an increase of 195% for assistance for homeless people when you compared the need for the homeless in 2015 and 2016. People in Ocean County need our help!....Let's be generous and in one way or another help those in need! The Hope Center is one of the ways we can help. The Hope Center is providing more and more services. For example, they now have 2 employees that work at the Hope Center from the Office of the Aging. They are also working hand in hand with Rental Assistance Organizations and exploring new options on how to raise money for those in need.

OPEN ARMS FOOD PANTRY

Open Arms Food Pantry" is a ministry of the Jackson Baptist Church. It is open from Monday through Friday from 11 A.M. to 2 P.M. The mission of "Open Arms" is to love, respect, and feed their clients. Eligible clients are sent to the pantry for food by the Ocean County Hunger Relief organization. The clients are hugged and greeted by two servers and then allowed to shop one family at a time. The volunteers develop relationships with their clients which helps the volunteers to pray for and with the clients. Some clients eventually attend church. When the client had finished shopping, prayer is done addressing the client's

needs, while holding hands in a circle with the entire pantry server staff. Food is supplied through various partnerships: church members financial and material donations, grateful clients wishing to "give back," Ocean County Hunger Relief, Monmouth-Ocean Food Bank, Shop-Rite of Jackson, Wawa, and the First United Methodist Church of Toms River.

In 2016: 1) 63095 pounds of food were distributed to 1959 clients, 2) 73% of the food was donated and 27% was purchased, and 3) 2330 pounds of food was donated by the First United Methodist Church of Toms River, which was equal to 5.1% of the donated food distributed.

FUMC OUTREACH

The Paula Brown Soup Kitchen will be providing dinner for needy people in Ocean County on April 18 and April 25 from 3-5 P.M. This is one of the great outreach ministries of our church. Please support this Biblical ministry with your donations of foodstuffs when you see the Paula Brown Soup Kitchen tables in the Family Life Center and Narthex.

The United Methodist Women's Rummage Sale has just ended and a big thank you goes out to all the people that donated goods to make it possible. Your donations allow many people to buy the clothing, etc. that they need. A big thank you goes out to all the people that helped set up and tear down the 2017 Spring Rummage Sale. Remember all the money made goes to UMW missions.

The United Methodist Men held a breakfast on Saturday, March 11th and were able to donate 300 dollars to our Educational Assistance Fund. All profits from each breakfast go to a mission or church sponsored program. Please come out and enjoy a great breakfast while providing funds for UMM missions.

The food collection for the needy in Ocean County will be held on Sunday, April 9th. If you attend the Contemporary Service, please place your donations on the table provided in the Family Life Center. If you attend the Traditional Service, please place your donations in the cart located in the coatroom next to the Narthex. The special hygiene items of the month are baby diapers, baby wipes, baby shampoo, and baby food.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT DEFINITION OF THE FOUR T'S OF STEWARDSHIP

A Biblical definition of stewardship is "having dominion over the works of God." The definition of stewardship can be broken down into four components. The Four Ts of Stewardship: time, ralent, temple, and treasure. God has given us our life and our time to manage as part of us being His steward. The definition of stewardship includes caring for all things that God has given us. This includes our bodies. The definition of stewardship also includes the making use of our talents and abilities that God has given to us. As God's chosen representatives, his stewards, God has also given us material things to faithfully administer for His glory.

THE FOUR T'S OF STEWARDSHIP

- 1. **TIME** God has given our life and our time to manage as part of us being his steward. As good stewards, he expects us to manage our time, our life, according to His will.
- 2. **TEMPLE** The definition of stewardship includes caring for all things that God has given us. This includes our bodies. As Christians, our bodies are the temples of the Holy Spirit. If our bodies are to be the temples of the Holy Spirit, then it goes without saying that we should not defile our bodies with any kind of sin.
- 3. **TALENTS** The definition of stewardship also includes the making use of the talents and abilities that God has given us. God has even given us unique talents and he desires us to put our talents to good use. As Christians, we can even say that God has ordained us with our unique talents to do His good works.
- 4. **TREASURE** A key definition of stewardship is being accountable for God's treasures. The Holy Bible tells u8s that all things are created by God and all thing's arte God's. As God's chosen representatives, His stewards, God has given us material things to faithfully administer for His glory.

Read this John Wesley Story—When John Wesley visited his congregations, he would question his assistants as to their progress in the faith. He would often ask if their Christianity had affected their pockets? That can be an acid teat of our values.

During this Resurrection season, we must remember the price that Jesus Christ paid for us. He gave His life at the age of 33 so that we could overcome sin and spend life eternal with God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit. OUR SECOND CHURCH BUILDING (1854-1874)

In 1850 Toms River became the county seat of the new county of Ocean. The historic "1850 Courthouse" was built and still stands as part of the courthouse complex.

The Jersey Shore enjoyed a boom. The growing population of New York City created an unprecedented demand for cord wood and charcoal. Wood was burned into charcoal in the vicinity of Double Trouble and then moved to the river's edge and loaded on schooners.

The town and population were growing rapidly. There was a need for a larger church building. In May 1853 the Trustees passed a resolution to buy land for a new meeting house. They agreed not to start the building until at least \$800 was subscribed. The money was raised by September. Where better to put the new church then next to the new courthouse. The church was built on the northwest corner of Washington and Hooper. The church was dedicated in 1854, and the approximate cost was \$3,500 with \$1300 remaining to be paid.

The new church was more pretentious than the first. It measured 38 X 50 feet and held three times as many people. The white, modified colonial style had narrow windows and a colonnade front. The steeple held the town's first church bell (cast in 1853 in Troy, New York). It rang at 8:45 A.M. and 9:45 A.M. on Sunday mornings and before evening services on Thursdays. Inside, the windows and door frames were trimmed with black walnut. There were 19 rows of pews, with a center aisle. Oil lamps on metal brackets provided the light for the church.

Keeping the church clean must have been a problem because a new sexton was hired at every trustees meeting for years. Finally, in 1859 a woman was hired and there were no more changes. Often there were penny collections to pay her.

In 1861 the first permanent minister, Benjamin Sharp, was appointed to the church. Toms River now became the head of the circuit of small settlements where Methodism had spread. The new circuit included churches at Cedar Grove, Kettle Creek, Bayville, Pleasant Plains, Whitesville and Lanoka Harbor.

The congregation met for worship and divided into classes for religious training. It was the class leaders responsibility to inquire about each member's spiritual well-being and to counsel them if they were not living up to their Christian commitments. Later, when a pastor was in charge, it was his duty to carry on the work of the class leaders. Records show that pastors checked on members who were frequenting taverns.

Because Methodist pastors are assigned their work for the coming year at Annual Conference there were 8 pastors between 1861 and 1875. (John Wesley held the first annual meeting in 1744. As the Methodist Church grew, the meeting was divided into Conferences, each headed by a bishop and holding its own Annual Conference).

FIRST QUARTER FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Church Council approved the 2017 budget of \$660,423. at its February 21st meeting. It is an aggressive budget which incorporates the vision for more outreach and ministry commitments. The Finance Committee is grateful for the estimate of giving cards received. 133 cards were received this year compared to 96 received in 2016. The submission of the estimate of giving card helps immensely in the budgeting process.

Estimate of giving breakdown: \$10,000.+ (5); 5,000.-9,999 (10); 1,000. - 4,999 (72); 501-999 (24); 1. - 500. (22)

Additional income: The Harold & Caroline Schmul Endowment Fund \$36,000 // Chestnut Hill Nursery School \$42,000.

Where will the fund go? 66% to ministry. 34% covers utilities, maintenance/supplies and FLC loan payments.

First Church continues to pledge financial support to Caregivers and Hope Center for the first quarter. Both organizations provide vital and sometimes life changing services to those they serve. Your generous support to the quarterly mission makes a difference in people's lives.

STAINED GLASS WINDOWS FROM OUR PAST

When First Church moved in 1973 from its original location in downtown Toms River a part of the history of the old church also moved to 129 Chestnut Street. A total of 11 leaded stained glass memorial windows were moved to our present location. Three (3) of the windows have been permanently installed in the Education wing of the church. However, for the past 44 years eight (8) of the windows have been safely stored, and are currently in the garage.

The Board of Trustees, because of the need for additional storage space in the garage, has decided that the eight (8) leaded windows must be removed. Our hope is that members of the congregation might wish to have a piece of our history by purchasing a window. It is the Trustees wish that in this way these windows can be preserved.

You can see individual pictures of each window thanks to the photography talents of Jeff Sayre on the link provided. click here. All of the windows are encased in their original frames. The eight (8) windows were commissioned and installed in 1949. The windows, all depicting Biblical characters, are marked either "in honor of or in memory of" indicating who gave them.

I have three weeks of radiation remaining, the hardest I am told. So-continue to pray for me–I know prayers work so don't let me down!


