Hope Lodge is a home in downtown Charleston where cancer patients and caregivers stay during treatment. Hope Lodge offers so much more than just free lodging. It provides a nurturing, home-like environment where patients and caregivers can retreat to private rooms or connect with others who

Trident Technical College's Clemente Project

HVPC's youth began a partnership with Trident Technical College's Clemente Project in 2011. The Clemente Project offers two free college-level humanities courses to the homeless and the disadvantaged. The



project's hope is that the critical reasoning skills gained from the study of the humanities would provide people with the tools needed to escape multi-generational poverty. Clemente students come from homeless shelters, drug and alcohol rehabilitation centers, veteran villas, prisons, and from the ranks of the working poor, financially unable to enter college. Clemente participants receive free tuition, meals, books, bus passes, mentoring, and refurbished computers. The HVPC Youth have provided dinners, dessert, school supplies for the project as well as held fundraisers in an effort to help.
