Living the Journey



The heart of the journey to faith we call the catechumenate story. When people share their stories, like those on the road to Emmaus the day of the resurrection, the risen Lord draws near and joins the conversation. In mystery and grace the stories move in the direction of the sacraments and encounter with Christ. I am delighted that David Hindman has shared this story from the life of the Wesley Foundation at William and Mary. It powerfully reminds us of the torque the catechumenal process brings to the life of the faithful.

"This year I am working with a first year college student who has been mostly a C[hristmas]and E[aster] Christian, whose parents 'wanted her to make her own decision about religion'. She has really gotten into the process quite well and is taking it incredibly seriously. That gives pause to other students who were born in the church and have not really thought much about it. Her faith friend/spiritual companion/mentor has also taken this seriously. They both meet with me weekly in a time in which we have done a variety of things, including reading scripture, discussed our personal devotion time, shared prayer forms, understandings of Communion, etc. They also meet weekly as a pair and talk about faith journey, worship, doubts, struggles, etc. What is exciting about this for me is that the mentor has found herself needing to reflect more on her own faith and is increasingly aware of the importance of her living a Christian life of integrity because of the impact that is having on the woman preparing for baptism.

"The more I do this, the more I am convinced this is a major way to make disciples. I regret that the institutional church still doesn't get it. Christendom is dead and gone, and we are in for a quite different need and opportunity for evangelization."

Undoubtedly the story sharing has been going on in your communities as inquirers or candidates and their sponsors/mentors journey together. May the days of Lent only intensify the sharing and the deep inner readiness of the heart for the sacraments of initiation at Easter.


