A task force was convened by former NAAC President Bryon Hansen in April to envision a new future for this ecumenical organization founded in 1995. With tongue in cheek, we spoke of the need to move from adolescence to adulthood as an association of practitioners of the catechumenate. At the 2008 Gathering, the NAAC Board unveiled plans for a feasibility study to be conducted over the next ten months to help craft a new and exciting future for NAAC. 2008 GATHERING HIGHLIGHTS

Over forty people, coming from diverse parts of the continent and representing several denominations, attended the 2008 gathering of the North American Association for the Catechumenate at the Dumas Bay Retreat Center near Federal Way, Washington. The featured speaker was Sam Torvend, Professor of Religion at Pacific Lutheran University. Dr. Torvend spoke of the challenge for the church is these postmodern times and spoke of the blessing of the catechumenate as a promising means of forming Christians. The opportunity is ripe to employ ancient wisdom. Daily prayer and eucharist were led by Clay Morris, Liturgical Officer for the Episcopal Church. Workshops offered participants insights into various aspects of catechumenal process and formation.

NA FORUM CONVOCATION

NAAC's big sister, the North American Forum, will host its convocation Nov. 6 to 8, 2008 in Cleveland, OH. The theme is "Handing on the Faith We Have Received." BOOK REVIEW

Ambrose of Milan's Method of Mystagogical Preaching by Craig A. Satterlee, The Liturgical Press. What is the relationship between word and sacrament, liturgy and mission, worship and discipleship? Craig Satterlee believes that the best way to get at these questions is mystagogically. Taking the fourth century Bishop Ambrose as his guide, Satterlee describes the challenges of today's church, illuminates the catechumenate of Ambrose's time, and suggests a way of formation. He suggests that sustained reflection on the experience of baptism and eucharist as an essential tool in formation. One of the best ways to do that is preaching. This book is both a solid piece of scholarship and a stimulating approach for preachers and teachers seeking to form Christians in a culture at odds with the values of the gospel. Dr. Satterlee teaches homiletics at the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago and will be the keynote speaker at the 2009 NAAC Gathering.

Bev Piro and Bryon Hansen remain on the Board. We welcome new members Rick Rouse (elected as president), Dan Benedict, Mary Peterson, Sherman Hesselgrave, Jay Koyle, and Sam Torvend. Each person on the new Board was asked to give a brief introduction.

Dan Benedict

I am a United Methodist elder/ presbyter who served as the Director of Worship Resources for my denomination from 1993-2005. I authored Come to the Waters: Baptism and Our Ministry of Welcoming Seekers and Making Disciples, an invitation to churches to embrace the ancient catechumenate in the 21st century. I have written and taught widely in the area of catechumenal ministry in both the US and Australia. I currently live in Hawaii and spend quite a bit of time with family in Virginia. I have been actively involved with NAAC since 1995.

Bryon Hansen

I have served as pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Auburn, California for one year and am currently serving on the Catechumenate Task for the ELCA Sierra Pacific Synod. Prior to this I served a parish in Portland, Oregon and assisted with catechumenate activities with the Oregon Synod and Oregon Episcopal Diocese. I have served on the NAAC Board since 2006 and will continue until the end of 2009. We are in the process of developing a catechumenate journey for adults at Bethlehem and shaping a catechumenal-like process of confirmation ministry for teens. I have a special interest in mystagogy, linking the sacramental life of the church with catechesis and formation.

Sherman Hesselgrave

I am the Incumbent of Church of the Holy Trinity in Toronto, a downtown parish with a long history of leadership in social justice ministries. Before my appointment in the Anglican Church of Canada, I served Episcopal and Lutheran congregations in the Pacific Northwest as a pastor and musician. My experience in the catechumenate includes planning and staffing regional training events, serving on a formation team, designing catechumenal materials, leading retreats, and sponsoring candidates.

Jay Koyle

I have a long and fruitful history of promoting vital and uplifting worship in the life of the church, and of inspiring others in their participation in and appreciation of the liturgy. A professor in the Faculty of Theology at Huron University College, University of Western Ontario, I also serve as an associate rector of St. Aidan's Anglican Church, London. My graduate work in liturgical studies was completed at the University of Notre Dame, Indiana, and my doctoral work in homiletics was completed through the Association of Chicago Theological Schools. My thesis was entitled: "Calling the Church to Its Heart: Preaching, Parish Catechumenate, and the **Revitalization of the Twenty-First** Century Congregation."

I am president of the Associated Parishes for Liturgy and Mission, an international organization devoted to liturgical and missional renewal in the Anglican Communion. A member of the North American Academy of Liturgy, I am director of Table Song: Eighth Day Perspectives, offering seminars and consultations in pastoral liturgy.

In both the local and the wider church, I have advocated and fostered the catechumenal process for over two decades. At present, I am involved in a Catechumenate Network in Southwestern Ontario that provides mutual support between practitioners and offers formation opportunities for catechumenal ministry in interested congregations.

Mary Peterson

I am delighted to be a member of the NAAC Board. I am excited about the present energy of the Board and amazing potential of NAAC's future. I am an ELCA pastor in the Oregon Synod currently

Richard Rouse

I previously worked for church relations at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington and am currently adjunct professor at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. I am the author of *Fire of Grace: The Healing Power of Forgiveness* and *A Field Guide for the Missional Congregations: Embarking on a Journey of Transformation* which I co-authored with Craig Van Gelder.

Samuel Torvend

I am a professor of the history of Christianity at Pacific Lutheran University with expertise in the baptismal and catechumenal theologies and practices of early Christianity. I also serve with the Formation and Enquiry Teams at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Seattle. In this part of North America, where very few people claim participation in a Christian community, history, theology, and practice meet challenges somewhat similar to those faced by early Christians. While we cannot pretend we live in the ancient world, catechumenal parishes can receive ancient wisdom around the formation of Christians for public service in the world.

BILL LOADER ON BAPTISM

Bill Loader, New Testament scholar at Murdoch University in Australia, has some very useful article on baptism on his website. Here is a sample:

"Water has to do all the hard work: softening, washing, refreshing, sometimes under pressure, changing and reshaping things. Water has shaped continents, carved out great gorges and dug deep valleys. Sometimes it rises and falls endlessly in the cycle of vapour and falling rain. Sometimes it hides deep within the earth's crust waiting future discovery. No wonder water has been a symbol of life and hope and depth and God.

"The droplets of water on a child's forehead in baptism in a moment of time symbolise an eternity of goodness flowing from the heart of God, a river of love that seeks unendingly to reproduce itself in the lives of people. Some people choose to be blocked pipes allowing no flow in or out, stagnant with their own pre-occupation or guilt or shame. Others want it only one way, receiving the flow, but then blocking its onward course for fear of loss or for fear of giving. Some belong to those dry lands so cut off from the flow that they fill the statistics of the 22,000 people who die daily from extreme poverty"
