What is a Missional Church?

- Common View: Congregations have a mission.
- New Testament: God has a mission and congregations to help carry it out—sharing the Good News for the sake of the world!
- A missional congregation is one that seeks to be a partner in God's mission!

Miseo Deo: What is God's Mission? "TO REDEEM THE WORLD"

Great Commission: "Go into all the world and make disciples!"

Great Commandment: "Love God and love your neighbor."

The Apostolic Paradigm*: 33 AD-333 AD

Characteristics:

- ▶ 1. The world and culture are hostile.
- 2. The door of the church opens up onto the mission field.
- ▶ 3. Every member is a missionary of the gospel.

Christendom Paradigm 333 AD-1960 AD

Assumptions:

- ▶ 1. The culture is friendly and supportive toward the church.
- 2. The mission field is somewhere "out there".
- 3. Church professionals carry out the work of ministry. Lay members support mission w/ prayer & money.

1960 to Present--Post Christian Era: Return to the Apostolic Era?

Roles Change in New Paradigm Church:

- ▶ 1. Laity are front line ministers.
- 2. Church professionals train and support the ministry of the baptized people of God.
- 3. Ministry takes place in the world—
 not only in the church. (Ministry in
 daily life.)

Post Christendom Paradigm Shift



Purpose: Mission Outreach,

- 1. Care of members is not end in itself, but "means to end" nurturing disciples.
- 2. Staff train and empower missionaries.
 - 3. Outcome: Ministry in Daily Life

Designing Congregations as Centers for Equipping the Baptized

- Post-Christendom Model (Return to ACTS) which is a MISSION model
- Focus is on DISCIPLESHIP (mission of the gospel—Matt 28) not MEMBERSHIP (maintenance of the institution)

Discipleship or Membership?

Not as concerned about numbers but about how well people are living their faith and sharing the Gospel.

Not as concerned about how well we care for members but how well we

serve needs of world around us.

An Ancient Rite of Church: Preparation for Baptism

- Spiritual Formation for Adults: Baptism/Affirmation of Baptism
- Means of "making disciples" with focus on baptismal living
- Renewal of "Priesthood of All Believers" (Martin Luther)



Pattern of Christian Initiation: A Journey of Discipleship

- ▶ 1a. Inquiry Stage
- 1b. Welcome Service (Rite of Welcome)
- 2a. Formation Stage
- 2b. Call to Baptism (Rite of Enrollment)

- 3a. IntensePreparation
- 3b. Initiation: Baptism or Affirmation of Baptism
- 4a. Integration Stage
- 4b. Affirmation of Ministry in Daily Life



- A. Preparation for the Rite: Learning the Steps
- B. Baptism or Affirmation of Baptism



STAGE FOUR: GO AND SERVE

- A. Integration Stage: Exploring our Gifts
- B. Affirmation of Ministry in Daily Life



A Journey of Discipleship: 4 Stages

- ▶ 1. Come and See: Inquiry (Questions)

 Rite of Welcome
- 2. Come and Explore: Catechesis Rite of Enrollment
- 3. Come and Prepare: Getting Ready Rite of Baptism/Affirmation of Baptism
- 4. Come and Serve: Baptismal Living Rite of Affirmation of Vocation

What the Catechumenate Is:

- A journey and celebration for those called to the Way of Christ.
- A natural process of Christian formation developed in early days of the Church that can be adapted to fit any congregation.
- "Leaven" for any faith community seeking new members and renewal of current members.
- Jesus' way of making & nurturing disciples.

What the Catechumenate Is Not:

- A program demanding more time of already over-extended clergy and parish leaders.
- A complicated, time-consuming program.
- Another adult education program.
- An expensive program demanding "experts" in Scripture or Christian doctrine.
- An inflexible, prescribed program of study.

Your "Faith Walk" Team

- 1. Coordinator of Discipleship Process: Help with design, training, and publicity.
- 2. Pastors: Help recruit, assist w/ inquiry, and lead the rites for public worship.
- 3. Catechists: Instructors for the journey.
- 4. Candidates: Learners for the journey.
- 5. Sponsors/Mentors: Companions on journey.
- ▶ 6. Host/Hostess: Provide refreshments.

The Four Stages of the Journey for the "Faith Walk" Team

- 1. Inquiry: Planting the seed; making a connection with mission and discipleship.
- 2. Exploration (catechesis): Introducing the parts of the Catechumenate.
- 3. Intense Preparation: Training
- 4. Baptismal Living (mystagogy): Ongoing prayer and support for the team.

PURPOSE: Welcoming people into a deeper relationship with Jesus and with each other so they can live faithful lives of discipleship.

Questions for Reflection:

- How do we welcome the unchurched? Are we eager to invite them into a saving relationship with Jesus Christ?
- How well do we prepare people to live out their baptismal calling in the world?
- Do you agree or disagree that the way to grow the church is to first grow disciples?
