# The Rev. Robert Stephen Slater Minister Emeritus 1928-2017

It is with great sadness that we report the passing of our beloved former minister, the Rev. Robert S. Slater, on May 1, 2017, at the Kaplan Family Hospice House in Danvers. Rev. Slater was minister here from 1968 to 1990, and became minister emeritus upon his retirement.

Bob requested that there be no memorial service, but that the following be read at the Sunday morning worship service. His wishes were carried out last Sunday. The family has requested that any memorial donations made to the church be designated for the courtyard renovations.

Robert Stephen Slater was born January 16, 1928, in Pasadena, Maryland, one of five children. He owes an immeasurable love to his mother, who raised him alone after his father died in 1931, but with the support of a stepfather. He graduated from Glen Burnie High School in 1945 and served 18 months in the Coast Guard. He then entered the University of Baltimore and graduated in 1951, aided by the G.I. Bill and working part time, such as at the Arthur Murray Dance Studio. On November 2, 1950, he took the most important and wonderful step of his life, marrying Robin Holzbach of Newport News, Virginia, a Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Syracuse University, former school teacher, and fellow teacher at the dance studio. Subsequently, they decided on a career in the ministry. Bob graduated from Harvard Divinity School in 1955 and served Unitarian churches in Northfield and Bernardston, Mass., Pittsburgh, PA (as assistant), and Westford, Mass. He began serving the Unitarian Universalist Church of Greater Lynn in 1968 and continued for almost 22 years. During those years, he came to love every member and friend of the church, including those with whom inevitable disagreements arose. He served the community, the Council of Churches, and the Mass. Bay District of UU Churches in a variety of ways, as well as being active with the UU Christian Fellowship for many years, serving as its president for two years, and founding the UU Psi Symposium for many years, serving as its president two years. Bob has been richly blessed by his association with the Lynn church.

The great loves of his life have been his wife, Robin, and their two daughters, Tracy and Kelly, who have been devoted to both Robin and Bob. Bob might summarize his religious beliefs by saying that all experiences in life offer opportunities for growth in the ways of love of all people and things, that the selfless example of Jesus is the way, and that life is continuous, not ending with the death of the physical body.

## Growing in Love Faith Development Through the Ages

My life since September has been a series of 'lasts'. Last time for Ingathering, last time for our Halloween Party, last time for My Brother's Table Christmas Party, last time for Faith Development Sunday, last time for Youth Sunday...... And the list goes on and on. I suppose one might say – metaphorically – that I am checking these events off a list waiting for the final day of retirement. But I have used this time wisely and soaked in every bit of Presence I could muster to be with you all – fully.

Many of my colleagues have asked me how I have managed to stay a religious educator all these years. Some want to know my secret to what I call a successful vocation. In 2013, Tim Atkins, the religious educator from Morristown Unitarian Fellowship in NJ, posted on our professional listserve the following: As I get ready for a big move and a step up to what I see as my calling, what would your top three pieces of advice be for a brand-new DRE? My colleague, Cindy Leitner, just recently reminded me of my post to this question when she emailed to find out if it was okay if she put my answer into a publication called RE Road Map. I couldn't even remember what I wrote. She had to send me the post. After I saw it I smiled. I smiled because what I wrote still rings true. Instead of sending Tim the top ten pieces of advice, I added seven more.

### Top 10 Ways to Succeed in Your Vocation According to Karen

- 1. Be organized. This is the key. You can be the very best creative in the world, but bad organization skills will get ya every time.
- 2. Love the people all of them. Listen to them deeply before you chart out a course.
- 3. Do everything in your power to create a good working relationship with your minister.
- 4. Be authentic and be self-differentiated. Nothing ever is as bad as it seems. Love what is!
- 5. Love what you do. If you don't, it will get too hard!
- 6. Take a few risks now and then.
- 7. Meet and be in covenant with other religious educators.
- 8. Watch your hours.
- 9. Get a life outside Unitarian Universalism.
- 10. Last but definitely not least develop a spiritual practice you love. It's how I have stayed an educator for 20 years.

So there you have it! Number nine – get a life outside of Unitarian Universalism – has been the most difficult. But I'll be testing those waters when I move to Florida as I chart out a new life for myself. I'll always be a religious educator. I might keep connected to the greater UU world by being on a regional or national committee. I might investigate the world of spiritual direction. I'm looking forward to getting to know the flora and fauna of the west coast of Florida, and I am definitely going to learn how to relax.

Thank you all for making my six years here in Swampscott a memory I will hold onto forever. I will be preaching on June 4<sup>th</sup>. I think I'll develop a top 10 list of what I think UU congregations should and can do to flourish and be robust going into the future. Don't ever think for a second that our faith communities will become a thing of the past. Faith communities will change for sure and maybe not look like they do now, but my prayer is that UU communities will always be relevant and life-giving. And this community in Swampscott WILL be part of that movement. Ralph Waldo Emerson wrote, *We let go of Angels to let Archangels in*.

One more 'last' – this newsletter column *Growing in Love* is my last one. I have grown in love being with you. I hope you have grown in love by being part of this community. Love will Guide us is my mantra, maybe you can make it yours too.

# Green Corner Open Space

On April 23<sup>rd</sup> the UUCGL celebrated Earth Day with a special service focusing on Open Space, the Green Sanctuary Ministry Team's theme this year. The church was decorated with beautiful murals painted by Trinidad Hudson, and was treated to reflections on open space from Trish Aldrich and John Benson, followed by a meditative visualization led by Chris Hanson. In case you missed the service, below are excerpts from Trish and John's sermonettes:

From John's reflection: "...Back in the middle of the nineteenth century, as urban areas expanded, streets, clogged with hundreds of horse-drawn carriages, became muddy quagmires in wet weather, and nearby waterways, like the Charles River in Boston, were hopelessly polluted. City residents, especially working people, had nowhere to go to get away from it all.

"Enter a new breed of enlightened thinkers called 'landscape architects' – like Frederick Law Olmstead, who saw a real need for people to reconnect with nature. Moving away from the regimented format of the formal European garden, he designed and built parks that imitated nature within an urban setting...

"Out of this vision came several hundred municipal parks and greenways nationwide, notably Central Park in New York City, and the famed 'Emerald Necklace' that threads its way through Boston.

"Olmstead's protégé and business partner, Charles Eliot, took this project to another dimension... Eliot, instead of constructing parks, wanted to set aside existing natural areas as 'reservations,' under formal trusteeship, to preserve, and make accessible, places of unusual scenic beauty.

"Eliot had set in motion the creation of the Boston Metropolitan Park System, which includes the Charles River Basin, Boston Harbor Islands, Lynn Shore, Nahant Beach, Revere Beach, Blue Hills, Breakheart, and Middlesex Fells Reservations. And he laid the foundation for the creation by the Massachusetts Legislature of the organization now called The Trustees of Reservations, whose holdings now include Appleton Farms in Ipswich; Castle Hill, Crane Beach, and the Crane Wildlife Refuge in Essex; Halibut Point in Rockport; Long Hill in Beverly; the Old Manse in Concord; Ravenswood Park in Gloucester; and World's End in Hingham. – All quite an accomplishment for a young, 'uneasy' Unitarian.

"Natural open space is necessary for life to evolve and continue its essential function; and people must have access to it in order to be aware of it. On what he called the 'extinction of experience,' Robert Pye wrote: 'I believe that one of the greatest causes of the ecological crisis is the state of personal alienation from nature.... We lack a widespread sense of intimacy with the living world.... People who care conserve; people who don't know don't care.' The genius of Olmstead and Eliot was to introduce the idea of setting aside special places close to urban areas so that the beauty of nature could be made known and readily accessible to millions of people.

From Trish's reflection: "Probably my first memory is running down a stonewall terrace in my parent's yard, jumping off the end, landing in the soft green grass, running up the side yard, back on to the terrace and running down the terrace, jumping, and flying through the air. And doing it again, and again.... I found joy, delight, and wonder in this open space, right in my back yard.

"Later I found more open space, a little further away, in my neighbor's yard. My neighbor and I climbed to the top of a tall copper beech tree in her yard. We climbed up and up. ... We hugged the tree, swayed with it and savored this open space.

"Later still I found more open space, bigger open space, wilder open space. The great state of Alaska called to me and I moved there ... when I was 21 years of age. A friend of mine soon asked, "Do you want to ski through Denali National Park? It's 100 miles and should take 5 or 6 days" I said, "Sure, that sounds great." In March, we chartered a ski plane ...and landed in a field of snow just outside Denali National Park. ... Then it was just the two of us, skiing through a vast snow-covered wilderness, to a road, 100 miles away.... We could see Denali, the great one, which is spectacularly impressive and beautiful. It was cold, so cold that when we threw water out sideways, it froze before it hit the ground ... There are no signs. There are no trails. You look at your map and the country side and make your way....It gave a whole new meaning to open space.

"Now, I work for the Ipswich River Watershed Association, a local environmental organization that protects the Ipswich River. .... Just last Thursday, we went for our annual lunchtime paddle to celebrate Earth Day. We saw budding red maples, flowering Silver Beech and a few turtles basking in the sun. We saw only one house in our 45 minute lunch break, since so much land has been set aside for conservation. It was so good to be on the river together.

"I encourage you to find your open space. Whether it's in your back yard, a short drive away, or elsewhere.
