a note from your pastor...

What is a pastor?

A member of this congregation recently asked me “What is a pastor, what does a pastor do?” Their question is sincere – they are asking; what all do you do? And what requirements are there to become a pastor? This person is observant and sees me doing many things, but has intentionally asked, “Tell me more.” My response was, well, that is a big question ... maybe a good newsletter article.

In the context of Methodism, a pastor is a leader of a Christian congregation. A pastor also gives advice and counsel to people from the community or congregation. Pastor is derived from the Latin word *pastor*, meaning *shepherd*. When used as a title, the term may be abbreviated to “Pr” or “Ptr” or “Ps”.

Pastor *is a verb* – to pastor is to care for and to shepherd a congregation, or a faith community. Pastor is also a title, such as *Pastor Mary*. In the United Methodist Church one becomes a pastor through a few different routes. First of all, one does not choose to become a pastor, *one responds to a call from God* to serve as a pastor, to pastor. All pastors hear this call in a unique way – as each of us is unique, and God speaks to all of us differently, we are all different people. This process of ‘hearing our call,’ takes time, and most often, a lot of discernment. Before I heard my call to ministry my first pastor explained to us in Disciple Bible Study, that one responds to a call to pastoral ministry *when no other calling satisfies them*.

I heard and responded to my call to ministry as a member of a United Methodist Church. After I said, “Yes” to God, I spoke with my pastor. He was very supportive and said, “I am not surprised, I recognized your calling when I first met you.” I was surprised! Actually, I was nearly speechless. I learned from Pastor Jeff that in The United Methodist Church there are three ways to become a *pastor*: (1) To attend seminary (full time 3 years), in preparation to become an ordained elder, and have the title of Reverend (2) To attend seminary (full time 2 years), in preparation to become a deacon, and have the title of Reverend (3) To attend course of study, and become a Local Pastor. In the process of becoming an ordained elder, a deacon, or a local pastor, one may be appointed as a supply pastor first. Serving as a supply pastor indicates one is ‘supplying’ a need, and is in preparation to pursue other education.

You may ask, “what is the difference?” The difference comes out of our call to serve ...

An *elder* is called to and ordained to **Word** – that is, *Preaching and Teaching*, **Sacrament** – counseling of and *administering the sacraments* – baptism and communion, and **Order** – *administration*. An elder gives leadership in all these areas, and aspects of worship, including marriage, burial and confirmation. Elders are appointed by the Bishop.

A *deacon* is called to and ordained to **Word, Service, Compassion and Justice**, and serves in a variety of specialized ministries, including, but not limited to: Christian education, music, communications and ministries of justice and advocacy. A specific call of deacons is to link the parish with the community. Deacons serve in all aspects of worship, including marriage, burial and confirmation. Unlike elders, who are appointed by the Bishop, deacons must find their own place of service.

A *local pastor* is one who is called by God to become a pastor, but does not see seminary as the best path for them. When appointed, a local pastor performs the duties of a pastor, including:

- Preaching and teaching
- Performing the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion in their appointment setting
- Performing the services of marriage (where state laws allow), burial and confirmation

A local pastor answers God's call to serve in a local congregation in The United Methodist Church. They need not make themselves available as itinerant ministers and are not ordained or elected into full membership of the annual conference. Additionally, a local pastor's authority is within their appointment setting and does not extend beyond it; local pastors attend local pastor school, Course of Study.

So, *pastor* is something pastors "**do**," and it is also **a title**; a pastor shepherds and is a shepherd. Each of these routes of ministry involve a specific and unique calling, and a considerable amount of education. *Additionally*, we have rigorous training, counsel and examination through the Board of Ordained Ministry. The Board of Ordained Ministry is tasked with recruiting and credentialing candidates and clergy, as well as recommending them for licensing and ordination and developing standards for continuing formation and regular evaluation.

Next month: I will share some of what a pastor does, what I "do."

Pastor Mary will begin leading/teaching this class – and she is looking forward to it! Our youth will keep me on my toes! And maybe I can keep them on their toes! Again, this is an opportunity to learn, grown and have fun.
