a note from your pastor...

May the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you – always!



What a time we are living in and through. I hope that you have been receiving daily emails and/or fb messages, or have had contact with someone from the church. Our lives have changed ... classrooms have converted to elearning, many of us are working from home or under different circumstances. Some of us have lost employment during this time. We are asked to be safe in our homes, to reduce the spread of the coronavirus, which causes Covid-19. All this means we have lost the ability to live our 'normal' lives. Easter Morning, I will bring worship to you into your homes, *via Facebook* again. It will not be the same as being in our sanctuary – but we will be together, as Henri Nouwen has invited us to realize. It will be different, but it will still be a special Easter! *Additionally* – we will celebrate Holy Communion as a part of this worship. *I had been envisioning this possibility!* Bishop Trimble has granted his Indiana clergy the permission to hold and lead a Service of Holy Communion on-line. He invited us to be certain our services are well planned and intentional.

I am printing a portion of Bishop Trimble's email:

Bishop's Guidance on Holy Communion during COVID-19

March 25, 2020

Dear Indiana United Methodists,

We are walking by faith and praying through this current crisis that has impacted our normal rhythm of worship and life. We have all been asked to do our part in curbing the spread of the Coronavirus (COVID-19). During this pandemic, the Church is still needed, though inperson worship has been suspended until further notice.

Unusual circumstances require us to adapt so that the Church can continue to be an instrument of God's grace. A number of pastors have raised concerns about the sharing of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. This communication is to provide helpful guidelines.

Holy Communion

Because of the limitations the pandemic is imposing, pastors have asked for permission to allow people to participate in Communion from home as you lead online worship. Pastors are now allowed to provide online Communion service as a way of extending sacrament as a means of grace. You are not required to, and some pastors have chosen to postpone Communion until gathered worship is allowed. Within our Wesleyan heritage, we must remember the place of Elders, Deacons, and Local Pastors licensed for sacramental ministry. It is the position of Bishop Trimble that this privilege is for a season, and there will be a return to traditional practices in accordance with our liturgy as soon as possible.

On Easter, we will worship live, the first time I preach on Easter morning it will *be live* – the last two Sundays I have recorded and uploaded. In real time, we will all have the opportunity to have Communion together. If this 'real time' does not work for you, access the Facebook service when it does work for you. Additionally, if you do not want to participate in Communion online, it is okay; as always, Communion is an invitation, albeit a holy invitation.

Here are some simple instructions:

- 1. Gather in your home, with the people who have been your immediate community during this time of physical distancing.
- 2. As you prepare to watch and listen to Easter worship on our Facebook page light a candle, have your Bible open to follow along when the scripture in read, prepare yourself to worship.
- 3. Assemble, ahead of time, juice and bread we use Welsh Grape Juice, 100% juice, in worship. Red wine is also permitted. For bread, gather a favorite bread, or perhaps bake a loaf for this Easter morning worship.
- 4. Consider 'setting the table.' Place your bread on a plate, your juice or wine in one large cup or individual cups for each person present. Cover the bread, juice, and cups with white napkins we

keep the bread and juice covered, out of respect for our Lord, except when we are consecrating or serving the elements. You may also include a cross or other Easter symbols.

- 5. Then, follow along when I lead us in worship. I believe it can be and *will be* very special. I look forward to worshipping *together*.
- 6. If you are living alone, is their one or two other persons you are *comfortable* inviting to join you?
- 7. Consider having music recorded music, or perhaps some of your family plays an instrument and sings?

Lent, Holy Week and Easter are a time of great intention. Holy Week is the most holy week of the Christian calendar. Pastors around the world are working under very different circumstances to be intentional and holy, to serve our flocks.

Steps for Drawing Closer to Christ

- 1. Take to heart Jesus' commandment to "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.' The second is this: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.'"


 Mark 12:30-31 What does love your neighbor as yourself look like? Jesus tells the parable of the good Samaritan. A man is traveling to Jerusalem and during the course of his travels, he is robbed and beaten. The injured man is encountered by three people; a priest, a Levite and a Samaritan. Upon seeing the wounded man, the first two pass by on the other side of the road. The third Man, the Samaritan, stops to offer assistance.

 After treating and bandaging his wounds, the Samaritan takes the injured man to an inn where he continues to care for him. The following day, the Samaritan man departs from the inn, but not before leaving money with the innkeeper for the injured man's continued care and promising to pay any additional expense when he returns.
- 2. Have a heart for others. One word- agape; agape is defined as wide open, especially with awe and wonder. Jesus calls us to set aside our love for self and to respond to others for the greater good. 1 Corinthians 13: 4-7 states that "Love (Charity) is patient, (charity) is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. (Charity) does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres."
- **3.** Look for the joy in your life. The transformation of turning water into wine was Jesus' first documented miracle. He and His disciples were invited to a wedding in Cana. Imagine Jesus and His friends are invited to a party, a celebration of sorts, a wedding, a day of joy and bliss. In addition, can you envision the joy Jesus felt as He welcomed the children of Israel who were brought to Him to be blessed? Suffer the little children to come unto me. With joy, Jesus welcomes the children, adding that they are indeed examples of the kingdom of heaven. **Psalm 100: 1- 2a** encourages us to "Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before him with joyful songs."
- **4. Relinquish social biases.** *Paralambano* means to welcome into one's fellowship and heart. This word implies the warmth and kindness of genuine love. In **Luke 6:32** it states, "If you love those who love you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners love those who love them." Jesus chose to interact with the Samaritan woman knowing that it was socially unacceptable. Yet Jesus recognized an opportunity to offer eternal life to a soul that was dying. Jesus said to the woman, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water." **John 4: 10** The Samaritan woman, who was essentially a social outcast among her own people, ran to bring others to experience this gift. Exclaiming, "Come, see a man..." **John 4: 29a**
- 5. Accept God's grace and forgiveness. Take the time to look up to Calvary. What do you see? It wasn't long ago that His arrival was celebrated. Now things have taken a dark turn. What has this man done? Heal the sick, raise the dead, bring new life to the sinner. What is His crime? Think about the depth of His love for you. He has taken your sins all the way to the cross. Savagely beaten and scourged, mocked, nailed to a cross and pierced in the side. Scripture says that "Jesus had cried with a loud voice, he said, Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit: and having said thus, he gave up the ghost. Now when the centurion saw what was done, he glorified God, saying, "Surely this was the son of God." Luke 23: 46- 47

Being sequestered is truly a challenge, but this time could prove to be an awesome opportunityan opportunity to grow closer to God. You are encouraged to take this time to draw closer to Christ and to put into action the example He provided for us.

Mail delivery is checked daily. Either way, you will be helping First Church to be ready to warmly receive you at the time when this "coronavirus cloud" lifts and our lives begin to return to normal.
