Certainly, we are living in interesting times. We are living in challenging times – for each of us, though in different ways.

I have appreciated hearing from all who have reached back with a text, message, email, phone call. Bishop Trimble is due to present to the churches in Indiana his plan for 'opening up the churches.' Through this time, he has been supportive and informative. My 'bosses' have been also. Currently, as I am moving to another district, I have two Conference Superintendents and two Associate Conference Superintendents. Each of them are supportive and informative, also. This is good! I have gotten the hang of 'Zooming!' A wonderful tool!

After Bishop Trimble shares his plan and expectations with us, I will be in contact with our church leaders on how best to 'open' Hammond First. We will make the plan, and work the plan – to be safe, and to continue to carry out the mission, "making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world."

By Prayer and Petition



One would think that the Christian life is exempt from worry. But in reality, it is not. For it is our humanity that makes us vulnerable to anxiety, loneliness and fear. It is, however, true to say that the Christian life should be a life of peace. Paul reminds the people at Philippi *"The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God."* Philippians 4:5b- 6

In Acts 27: 21- 25 "Paul stood up before (his captors) and said: "Men, you should have taken my advice not to sail from Crete; then you would have spared yourselves this damage and loss. But now I urge you to keep up your courage, because not one of you will be lost... Last night an angel of the God to whom I belong and whom I serve stood beside me and said, 'Do not be afraid, Paul... God has graciously given you the lives of all who sail with you.' So keep up your courage, men, for I have faith in God that it will happen just as he told me."

Paul knew that the presence of anxiety, even though unavoidable, need not manifest itself in the form of a mental prison. Ask yourself:

- Am I laughing less?
- Do I view things from a negative point of view?
- Would people who know me describe me as increasingly critical or negative?
- Do I always look for something to go wrong?
- Is the glass half empty or half full?

If you see yourself in these examples, Christ offers a new way. These five verses that will help to lead you to God's awesome promise:

- **Philippians 4:7** And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.
- Philippians 4:13 I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me.
- **Proverbs 3: 5-6** Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, And He shall direct your paths.
- Philippian 4: 11b- 12 I have learned to be content whatever the circumstances. I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty.
- **Philippians 4: 19** My God will meet all your needs according to the riches of his glory in Christ Jesus.

The scriptures do not speak of the anxiety Joseph experienced as his brothers negotiated with the Egyptians for a fair price in exchange for his life as a slave. After refusing to bow down and worship the idol and god of Babylon, Shadrach, Meschach, and Abednego showed no signs of anxiety as they were thrown into a fiery furnace, which was heated seven times hotter than normal. Even though the king had sent out a decree for all Jews to be killed, Queen Esther was not deterred when she decided to go before him to plead for her people. Jesus, knowing the inevitable outcome at Calvary, prayed in the garden of Gethsemane saying, "Not my will, but thy will Lord."

God loves His children. He oversees our world. He monitors our lives. You don't have to check to see if the Boogieman is in the closet or if there is a monster hiding under the bed. Listen carefully and you will hear the Lord say, "*Be anxious for nothing.*"

Matthew 6: 26 tells us "Look at the birds of the air; they do not sow or reap or store away in barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not much more valuable than they?" The son of God spoke to the storms and winds stood still. Never lose faith, for God is in the storm.

Calm Amidst the Storm



Matthew 8:18, 23-27:

Now when Jesus saw great crowds around him, he gave orders to go over to the other side. . . . And when he got into the boat, his disciples followed him. And behold, there arose a great storm on the sea, so that the boat was being swamped by the waves; but he was asleep.

And they went and woke him, saying, "Save, Lord; we are perishing." And he said to them, "Why are you afraid, O men of little faith?" Then he rose and rebuked the winds and the sea; and there was a great calm. And the men marveled, saying, "What sort of man is this, that even winds and sea obey him?"

Throughout this period of social distancing, I am grateful that I can still take my threemile morning walk in the neighborhood six days a week. I cherish this time for centering, thinking, and planning, but most of all because it's a time for prayer, both speaking to and listening for God.

My walks have been especially quiet as everyone shelters in their homes, and not long ago, I was disconcerted by the sight of snow covering the daffodils. That morning it occurred to me that the strangeness of the April snow is in some ways not unlike our experience with the coronavirus outbreak and sequestration. It feels like we're living through an exceptionally long but quiet and powerful storm. We can't hear it or see the virus, but this is a storm. It is every bit as disruptive and deadly as a world-wide weather disaster, raging everywhere at once.

Unless we or a loved one are infected or are dedicated doctors or health care workers who are treating Covid-19 patients, we may feel oddly removed and helpless. We can't stop the storm, but we can't get out of the boat, either. Even if the storm has not yet blown into our neighborhood, its impact has upended millions of lives, the way we work and do ministry, and the way we practice our faith *in community*. And, we have no way of knowing when it will end. We try to maintain a positive attitude, but it can be hard to overcome moments of fear and uncertainty.

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Matthew's scripture tells us that when a storm suddenly arose that day on the Sea of Galilee, the fearful disciples in the boat with Jesus woke him. He already knew why they were afraid, but his question challenged them to live into their faith. Jesus wanted them to understand that they could let go of their fear because *he was with them*. Although his words admonished them, what he really meant was, "You have no reason to be afraid because I am *right here beside you*; you need to believe and trust in me. I have things under control, and I will save you." And he did. He spoke to the winds and sea and Matthew wrote that there was *great calm*. Just like that, the storm ended.

Among other devotions, I have a small calendar that I've used for many years; each day has a message and scripture. Just as the coronavirus was beginning to spread across America, the March 1 message read, "The Lord will either calm your storm or allow it to rage while he calms you." Those words seem particularly appropriate for this unprecedented spring. The viral storm is raging, but if we have faith, God will calm us and help us see our way forward. Even amidst life's greatest storms, God *is right here beside us* and has the power to give us *great calm* if we turn to and trust in Him.

We need His help, and we need each other, even when we are apart. As we allow Him to calm us, He will guide us to find the way forward, whether it's coping with illness, job loss, shaky finances, or our community of faith that seems painfully disconnected as we are unable to gather in person for worship or ministry. As we live out being the body of Christ in new and different ways and as we plan for the time when we can once again worship together, I believe we are all called to encourage and calm others.

Jesus assures us that faith will overcome fear. He is right here with us, and He is in control. We are not going to tip over or be lost at sea. And with His help and His great calm, we can persevere, focusing on the light that will come at the end of this storm. May God deepen our faith and help us to use our gifts of leadership, compassion, and service to model the calm and trust of Jesus.
