

a note from your pastor...



It's been mid-March since most of us have been in any type of gathering of folks – let alone any gathering in a church. I am sure the challenges are stark – loneliness, job security, etc. – but I want to encourage you by saying this is the safest thing the church can be doing for itself.

During the time organizations and businesses have been re-opening, one of the places having the hardest time not spiking an outbreak are churches. So, rather than being a supposed capitulation to fear, the church steering clear of in-person worship is a courageous and loving act we are committing for ourselves and our community. It's an act I commend you for.

And, at some point, we are going to be back in church. And when we are, we are going to have to come to terms with how much about that experience is going to have changed/will be changing.

First, Sunday morning will look different. When we return to in-person (tentatively set for September 13th), we will be requiring masks (in line with new public health guidelines), practicing social distancing, and not engaging in congregational singing – among other things. It will feel weird. Not everyone will be able to be there. Of course, the experience will likely change over time, but things will have changed.

Second, we will be less than a year away from the rescheduled 2020 General Conference. If you are unfamiliar with the situation, the United Methodist Church has a huge business meeting every four years. This meeting sets budgets, legislates issues of church doctrine, and is a gathering of people from around the world. This particular meeting will decide the future of the UMC and whether it will be one or many churches afterwards. You might not have known any of this. You may have known and forgotten in the fog of COVID-19. Either way, that will also be a thing that changes/will change.

Finally, the entire concept of how we do church is changing/going to change. It was in process before, but it was accelerated with the virus. Church rolls have suffered for decades, programs have declined, and budgets have taken a beating, as well. That's forgetting the fact that EVERY church has been gifted an online campus of their church that now needs tending. Most churches will need a plan to help in the immediate term, but ALL churches will need a plan for how they will continue on as communities of faith. First UMC of Hammond is no exception. You've heard for years that this was the case, but now is the time when you'll see those changes.

I'm excited. We have an opportunity to be pioneers of a new era in the life of the historic Christian faith. It will not be easy. Parts will even be incredibly hard. However, if we remember the reason we are doing it all in the first place – the gospel of Jesus Christ – we'll always be headed where we need to go.




Initial Plans Underway for Limited Reopening in September

Thank you to everyone who has submitted the Safe Sheltering Survey you were sent (via email or snail mail) in May. A subteam from the Church Council is now working with Pastor Chris on plans for a limited reopening of the church for corporate worship in the church sanctuary beginning *September 13*. Detailed information and protocols that everyone attending worship will be required to follow (including masks and strict social distancing) will be mailed to all members in August.

The mailing will include a required reservation form for those interested in attending inperson worship on *September 13* (a maximum of 25 persons, for at least the first month). Upon the church's receipt of each signed form, reservations will be honored on a firstcome, first served basis. Because the number of Covid-19 cases continues to rise in Lake County, we are especially mindful and committed to taking every precaution possible during the pandemic to keep all members of our faith community as safe and healthy as possible.

Please watch your mailbox and check email regularly for upcoming information about the church's reopening.

Help "Stuff the Bus" to Support Local Schools

As a community mission project for the 2020 Annual Conference session, the Indiana Conference Board of Laity planned a project called "Stuff the Bus." A school bus parked on the Indiana Wesleyan University campus in Marion, Indiana—where clergy and laity planned to convene in June for the Annual Conference session—would be literally "stuffed" with donated school supplies for the students and teachers at Marion CommUNITY Schools. This school district, like some others in our state, has many students from financially challenged families who have difficulty obtaining needed school supplies. However, as we all know, Covid-19 intervened. The large in-person gathering at Indiana Wesleyan was transformed: now only a small conclave of Conference leaders will be at IWU on August 15, and the Annual Conference session will be live streamed from there to as many as 90 percent of Annual Conference voting members, who will participate remotely and vote online from their homes.

This change of plans for Indiana Wesleyan meant that the Board of Laity had to move to a "Plan B" for the Stuff the Bus project. To avoid physically handling school supplies for the project, the Conference instead is accepting **online donations** that will be distributed to the schools to purchase the needed supplies. The donation period kicked off on July 28 and **will be open until August 22**.

Although support for Marion CommUNITY Schools was the original recipient because of the proximity of that district's schools to IWU, the Board of Laity recognizes that student needs for school supplies exist statewide. Accordingly, 30 percent of donations for Stuff the Bus will go to Marion CommUNITY Schools, with the remaining 70 percent divided equally among the 10 districts of the Indiana Conference. The District Operations Team of each district will determine which school or schools in their district will receive a donation to purchase school supplies.

Living a Normal Life.....

The **Power for Living Sunday School Class** is currently studying the book **Everybody is Normal Until You Get to Know Them** by author John Ortberg. In the article, I would like to take this opportunity to share with you a brief summary from the first chapter:



When shopping in certain stores there is inevitably a section that catches the eye; the section of reduced prices. It is not unusual to come across a tag that reads *"as is."* This is a way of saying "damaged goods" or "slightly irregular." This is the department where you can depend upon something to go wrong: a flaw, a stain, a zipper that doesn't zip, a button that doesn't butt. This is the department of misfits and ill-formed: no returns, no refunds, no exchanges. You have been sufficiently warned.

Now let's consider the human element. It may be someone you hold very close, someone dear to you. That person is "slightly irregular," "flawed," not at all form fitting." If you are looking for perfection, you have wandered into the wrong department.

All we want to do is find someone (like ourselves) *normal*. In fact, we would be crazy to not want one of those.

We have just walked into an area that does not exist. We all want a normal Uncle Ed or Grandma Sue. A mother thinks to herself, "If only my child could be normal for once." It's kind of like going fishing in the Sahara. But — the greatest mark of maturity is to surrender to the notion that there is no normal.

The most difficult part of this reality is accepting that we are indeed a part of the *"as is"* department. It's a lot like the *"totally normal woman who stalks her ex-boyfriend."* So, what does this actually look like. And if the excessive stalking of an ex-love interest is not normal, but in fact to-tally normal, how do we define weird?

God knows that we are not normal. Scripture states *"We all, like sheep, have gone astray..."* **Isaiah 53:6** and *"for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God..."* **Romans 3:23.**

Have you ever noticed how many messed up families there are in the Bible?

- Cain becomes jealous of his brother, Abel, and kills him.
- Abraham plays favorites with his sons, Jacob and Esau.
- David seduces Bathsheba and later has her husband killed on the battlefield.
- Joseph's brothers plot to kill him and end up selling him into slavery.
- And the list continues...

We are talking about people who have their own category in the DSM-V. So why do we find these people in the Bible? The most important reason — we are all weird. Weird yet worthy.

How do we live in a normal community with dysfunctional, *"as is"* people? The answer to this question brings us back to **Romans 3:23** *"for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God,."* Everyone of us travels with our own baggage. This baggage could hold a multitude of surprises: selfishness, envy, jeal-ousy, rejection, abuse, neglect... Our personalities are shaped by the sum total of our experiences and some of these experiences may leave deep, festering wounds.

As Christians, we are not normal people waiting to be of service to an *"abnormal"* world. We all come to the table *"as is."* To achieve community, God's desire for us is not simply congregant to congregant. It is for all relationships: with our spouses, children, co-workers, everybody. Christ's challenge to us is to create little islands of love, grace and forgiveness for those of us who come to Him *"as is."*





From First Church's Finance Committee, this is the sixth time this year that financial data is included in the monthly newsletter. For this and future newsletters, the aim is to provide you with:

Comments:

- Each year, an audit of the Church's books for the previous year (2019 in this case) is performed. This audit is normally performed in early spring – aiming to complete it by mid-May. (Results of the audit are subsequently submitted to the District and Conference.) The audit for 2019 has not yet been performed due primarily to COVID-19, however, a plan to complete it by the end of August will be formulated next week. To limit exposure, fewer members of the Finance Committee will participate this year.
- June was not a good giving month which is not unusual for the early summer months of "normal" years. The year-to-date (YTD) gap between CE giving and spending has increased to \$18,311 (see above) from a gap of \$12,506 last month. For 2020 YTD, actual giving is \$2,924 above the giving estimate and actual expenditures are \$28,196 below the spending estimate. These are two favorable trends which we hope continue for the balance of the year!
- In spite of the continuing challenges this year due to COVID-19, church giving has been good so far this year. Your continuing faithfulness and generosity are most definitely appreciated!




