

a note from your pastor...

As my family and I have been with you for about 9 months, but since we've been in this qualified state of existence through this pandemic, you haven't been able to see just what a geek I am.



Por ejemplo, before this last week, the last movie I had seen in the theatres was *Avengers: Endgame* – a comic book movie. I took my nephews to see it on opening weekend. Before that, I took my wife and daughter to see *Avengers: Infinity War* – another comic book movie. One of our family's favorite movies is *Thor: Ragnorak* – a comic book movie. I have enlisted my family to dress up in cosplay to win local comic book conventions.

I am a geek, and it's no surprise I would choose this as a metaphor for where I think we are.

Kal-El – or Superman – was sent to earth by his parents to avoid begin killed when his planet was destroyed. He was sent to Earth because our atmosphere would mean he would have super strength and our sun had healing qualities for him. Whenever Superman has been severely beaten or defeated in any way, there is usually a scene in the comics and movies where Superman will fly straight up through the clouds in order to get a direct shot at the sun.

So, as we begin to meet in person once aguín, let me invite you to continue to use cautious optimism. When we do that, we will all be able to fly up through the clouds and bask in...the Son.

The Path to Obedience



In Gethsemane, the focus is on Jesus' interaction with His Father. On the night before He died, following the last supper with His disciples, Jesus is seen in the garden praying. More specifically, He is pouring out His heart to God. In all of His humanity, Jesus knows what's to come and the human part of Him is struggling. He feels isolated, abandoned, distressed. In the midst of this emotional turmoil, Jesus is no longer able to hear the voice of the Father.

In the text Embracing the Uncertainty, Magrey R. deVega shares this story:

A man is talking to the family doctor, "I think my wife's going deaf." "Try to test her hearing and let me know how severe her problem is before you bring her in for treatment," the doctor said. So that evening when his wife was preparing dinner, the man stood 15 feet from her and asked, " "Honey, what's for dinner? " No response. He moved ten feet behind her and asked again.No response Then he stood five feet behind her and tried again, but still got no answer. So finally, he stood right behind her, "Honey, what's for dinner?" She turned around. "For the fourth time, I said chicken!"

Talk about a revelation! This illustration is used to suggest that we all experience hearing difficulties at one time or another. It is those challenging moments when we are unable to hear the voice of God, discern His will and fully surrender to His call. More often than not, we assume that God does not hear us because He does not provide the answer we are looking for. "The problem is not whether or not God is speaking to us, but whether we have done enough to listen..." In **Proverbs 2: 1-5** we find these words, *"My son, if you accept my words and store up my commands within you, turning your ear to wisdom and applying your heart to understanding— indeed, if you call out for insight and cry aloud for understanding, and if you look for it as for silver and search for it as for hidden treasure, then you will understand the fear of the Lord and find the knowledge of God."*

Even as He anquished in the Garden of Gethsemane, Jesus remained aware of two things: God's words and God's will. Jesus had a choice; comfort or compliance, self-preservation or self-sacrifice, my will or thy will.

In our most difficult trials, we have a choice. We can choose to follow Christ- to allow Him to lead us through the darkness without fully knowing where the light will take us or venture out on our own. Choosing the path of least resistance does not promise a positive outcome, but scripture promises that if we remain obedient to the end that we will find blessings. **1** Kings **2:3** tells that when we *"Walk in obedience to him, and keep his decrees and commands, his laws and regulations... Do this so that you may prosper in all you do and wherever you go."*

Truth be told, Jesus will call us out of our comfort zones. But being in tune to that which God calls us to do requires focus and discipline. In scripture the book of **Job 26:14** describes God from this perspective, '...these are but the outer fringe of his works; how faint the whisper we hear of him! Who then can understand the thunder of His power?"

How faint is His whisper, so how intently do we need to listen? The answer to this question is simply. S-O-S-scripture, others and silence.

Scripture- In order to hear God, it is important that we know God. The best way to get to know God is to encounter Him through the scriptures. Study to show yourself to God as one approved, a worker who does not need to be ashamed and who correctly handles the word of truth. 2 Timothy 2:15
Others- Surround yourself with others with whom you can share your faith. "...where two or more are gathered in my name, there am I with them." Matthew 18:20
Silence- Quiet your heart and mind. "Be still and know that I am God." Psalm 46:10a

Truly God knows our every thought even before we share the first sentence . He just wants to commune with His children. In the words of **Luke 1: 46b-48**, we receive these words, *""My soul glorifies the Lord and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant."* Consider the lilies of the field. They neither reap nor sow, yet our God cares for them. How much more does He care for us. Obedience merely moves us closer to the King.
