I shared with you in a sermon that on vacation I read some of Herman Melville, the great 19th century American writer. Melville has a phrase in his most famous short story, "Billy Budd," which reads as follows:

"...hold[ing] the Present at its worth without being inappreciative of the Past." $% \label{eq:posterior}$

It strikes me in our Adult Education theme for this Fall – "Navigating the Seas of Change" – it is important, whenever possible, to be appreciative of the past even when we live in a time in which many things are changing quickly, some changes of which we are supporters or agents. While to be sure there is much in the past that must be faced, acknowledged, and confessed, there is much in the past that is worthy of our appreciation, even as we change from it. Graciousness is a virtue that is often in order when we look at those who have gone before us, even with their flaws, in much the same way as those who follow us will be more aware of our flaws than we are.

Navigating the seas of change can be draining. It can be energizing. It is often both. It is nice when we can appreciate the past and hold the changes in the present at their worth.

The Museum was a family business founded in 1792 and operated in this location from 1805 until 1933. Dr. Graham A. Cosmas, Deputy Director of the Joint History Office at the Department of Defense Joint Chiefs of Staff from 2001 to 2012, will give us an overview of the Spanish-American War and its subsequent effects on the American armed forces

and the world position of the United States. Graham is the author of An Army for Empire: The U. S. Army in the Spanish-American War, 1898-1899; The Medical Department: Medical Service in the European Theatre of Operations; and several books on the Vietnam War. Graham has also published numerous articles and book reviews, and is writing a chapter on the Spanish-American War for a new West Point Military Academy history book.

Dr. Cosmas was born in Weehawken, New Jersey, and received his education from schools in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, and Leonia, New Jersey. He received his Ph.D. in History from the University of Wisconsin (Madison), after attending Oberlin College and Columbia University. He has taught history at the University of Texas (Austin), the University of Guam, and the U. S. Military Institute, Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania. Graham is Treasurer of the Society for Military History and a Trustee of the U. S. Commission on Military History. He is an active member of Westminster and resides in Bailey's Crossroads.

Justification: Is It Still the Article by Which the Church Stands or Falls?

Rev. James F. Cubie, Associate Pastor for Christian Formation at Leesburg Presbyterian Church

2017 is the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, which gave birth to the fundamental set of beliefs that make us Protestants—our beliefs about the Bible, grace, sin, and who God is. At the center of those beliefs is the doctrine of justification: that we don't



earn God's love, it is given to us as a gift. In the 16th century, this idea became an effective prophetic protest against the theology and practices of the Roman Catholic Church. But a lot has happened since then; is this fundamental doctrine still at the center of what we should believe? Join us at the men's retreat to answer that question!

We are fortunate to have the Rev. James F. Cubie as our leader. He has served with the Reformed Institute of Metropolitan Washington since 2011 as a member of the Company of Teachers, leading seminars and retreats. He is also a frequent lecturer on religion and theology. He received his Master of Divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary in New York City, and holds a Master of Theology degree from Princeton Theological Seminary.

It is not too soon to mark your calendar to reserve this weekend. The retreat will again take place at the popular Hallowood Retreat and Conference Center, located at the base of Sugarloaf Mountain near Comus, Maryland. Sign up will begin in early November.


Thank You!

How Do We as Christians Navigate the Seas of Change?

The Bible is filled with stories of radical change. Many dared to claim a faith that was about something bigger than what they could identify, control or explain. Our Presbyterian theology advocates a stance of "reformed and always being reformed." But complacency and fear frequently hold us back, when we cling to how things have always been and resist change in others and in ourselves. This resistance to change often results in us hurting one another.

On September II, General Cartwright reminded us to lead with our gifts to respond to this changing world. From massive upheavals in technology, migration, and governance to shifts in land, ecosystems, food distribution, climate, and racial divides, we are called to examine our own choices, beliefs, ideals and interactions. It is Christ's light, found in each of us, that is not to be hoarded nor souandered, but to be received and reflected in the seas of change.

The Adult Education classes this year offer insights into navigating change. Through them, we hope that you will be infused with God's spirit to further God's Kingdom in the communities and neighborhoods where you live. What change might you undertake this year? What change might you lead others to make? How might we create hope and encourage one another as we encounter changes and embrace uncertainty? The good news of the gospel is that certainty is an illusion, but the mystery of God can change the world. Trust "always being reformed..."

of Chasing the Divine in the Holy Land (2012) and Ruined (2016), a memoir.




October 9- Spirituality in the Smartphone Age

Racial Awareness and Mindfulness 2016

A Mini-Festival of the Arts, Awareness, and Healing

What can be done about race relations in America? How can I participate in any meaningful way? What are churches doing to encourage reconciliation and understanding between people of different races and backgrounds?

If any of these questions have been on your mind, you might consider attending a free event called "The Racial Awareness and Mindfulness Festival of the Arts, Healing and Justice." Organized by Therese Taylor-Stinson, moderator of National Capital Presbytery and recent leader of the Westminster Women's Retreat, this event is being sponsored by national and local groups including Black Presbyterians United, NEXTChurch (PCUSA), and the Howard University School of Divinity. It will feature Erika Totten, DC Black Lives Matter Co-Director and Katrina Browne, the producer of the PBS documentary *Traces of the Trade: A Story from the Deep North.*

Planned activities include facilitated workshops, a keynote speech, and music, spoken word, and drumming demonstrations. It is intended that these activities will allow people to explore the reality of racism in recent events from different perspectives. In the end, the organizers say that after this event "we hope churches, organizations, and individuals will be more self-reflective regarding the impact of racism on their lives and the lives of 'the other' and we hope they will be inspired to join anti-racism organizations, to have their churches and organizations partner with others across the racial divide, and to continue to engage with the participants they met at the festival throughout the year."
