From the Pastor's Study A Message From Rev. Dr. Larry Hayward Silence and Speech (Luke 1)

In recent months, women have come forward and accused well-known men in journalism and media, entertainment, the corporate world, and political life of having sexually harassed or abused them. While women or girls are not the only victims of abuse, nor are men the only abusers, at this particular moment it is women and girls who are finding voice and courage to speak.

When presented with credible allegations, most sectors have reacted quickly by dismissing the men from their positions; in the political realm, voters or elected officials determine the outcomes, and the process is slower. The employment status in the current cases are not decided in courts of law; rather, they are decided on the basis of whatever power a particular employer has to dismiss an employee, even though most in the news are powerful and wealthy "employees."

In one of this season's stories from Luke, a priest named Zechariah receives a vision from an angel of the Lord that his wife Elizabeth will give birth to a son who will prepare the people of God for the coming of their Lord. Zechariah questions the vision, and the angel who conveys it orders him silent "until the day these things occur." His silence in that moment is golden. A few months later, when Elizabeth gives birth to their son, Zechariah writes on a table that "his name is John." Then Zechariah's "mouth [is] opened and his tongue freed." Their son is John the Baptist, who prepares the way for Christ.

Silence is not always golden. In cases of sexual abuse, men and women alike have sometimes been silent in not confronting or reporting suspicious activity to proper authorities (when such are in place). But neither is all speech golden. Sometimes people speak in ways that directly or indirectly blame the victim. Sometimes people make false accusations. Sometimes people speak in ways that are more motivated by the thrill of sharing gossip and scandal. There is "ungolden" speech as well as "un-golden" silence.

But when people find the courage and strength to speak about what has happened to them, and when they decide the time is right in their lives or the lives of their family members, their speech is redemptive for their lives and for future generations. If their speech leads people who are guilty to take responsibility for what they have done, their speech can be redemptive for the guilty as well.

Most of us – men and women alike – can learn from the Zechariah story. After his divinely-imposed silence, when Zechariah speaks it was toward redemption. "Zechariah's mouth was opened and his tongue freed, and he began to speak, praising God." His speech became golden.

Grades 6-12 - Youth Ensemble - Sunday - 6 PM



Westminster Weekday Preschool 2018-2019 Registration

In-house registration for the fall of 2018 will begin on January 10, 2018, and will end on January 19 at noon. In-house registration includes former or current preschool families and Westminster church members. (To be considered under the definition of church member, at least one parent must have joined the church by December 31, 2017.) Classes will be available for children who have reached the ages of 2½*, 3, or 4 as of September 30, 2018. (*Applications will be accepted for in-house families whose children turn 2½ by December 31, 2018.) Westminster church members, or former preschool families interested in enrolling their children, may pick up an application in the preschool office beginning January 10. In-house applications are due by noon on Friday, January 19. If necessary, a lottery will be held at noon on January 19 for open spaces.

Update from the Personnel Committee

Most of us were taught in civics class or history class that our Constitution established three branches of the federal government – Executive, Legislative, and Judicial – to provide checks and balances on each other and prevent any one of them from exercising untrammeled power over the people. We currently are experiencing a blurring of the lines and boundaries of

authority between the powers of the President and executive departments, the Congress (Senate and House), and the Judiciary (Supreme Court and federal judiciary).

During recent decades, Presidents have abrogated power by issuing Executive Orders that have blatantly contradicted the stated will of Congress; Congresses have passed laws that have allowed federal departments a wide berth to issue regulations that were never the intent of the legislation, and the Supreme Court and the federal judiciary have in essence created new law by interpreting existing federal laws in novel ways.

Fowler West is President of West & West LLC, located in Alexandria, Virginia. His work largely involves protection of the environment, especially the Everglades Ecosystem. He spent more than 20 years on Capitol Hill, where in addition to serving as Administrative Assistant to former Rep. W. R. Poage of Texas and as Staff Director of the House Committee on Agriculture under Chairman Poage and former House Speaker Thomas S. Foley, he worked on major agricultural, conservation, rural development, credit, nutrition and foreign food aid programs, including several major farm bills. Fowler also served two terms as a Commissioner at the United States Commodity Futures Trading Commission (CFTC). He was twice appointed by President Reagan and confirmed by the Senate.

Fowler has a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science from Baylor University, a Master of Arts degree from George Washington University, and Juris Doctor degree from the Georgetown University Law Center. In 2001, Fowler was the recipient of the Steward of the Everglades Award, presented by the Everglades Coalition, for his work in the passage of the Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Plan legislation. He serves as Co-Chair of the Standing Committee of the W. R. Poage Legislative Library at Baylor University.

Protestantism became a movement only because Reformers set an urgent agenda to extol Jesus' decisiveness from amidst the heaps of trailing phrases and outrageous failings. Does any of this sound relevant five hundred years later? Jon will explore with us some of




the ways in which the Reformed tradition provides a rich legacy of engaging the world with an urgent conviction that Jesus alone is the point, the period, the exclamation of a redemptive story.

We are fortunate to have Jon D. Wood as our leader. He has served with the Reformed Institute of Metropolitan Washington since 2013 as a member of the Company of Teachers, lecturing and leading seminars on religious topics. He received his Master of Divinity from Princeton Theological Seminary, and also holds a Ph.D. in Church History from Princeton. He is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Religion at George Washington University, where he teaches the history of Christianity and world religions.

Stock Donations and End of Year Giving: If you are using a stock transaction to make a donation, remember that stock transactions may take a week or more to process. Also checks to the church must be postmarked or received before the end of the year to be considered tax deductions for the year 2017 or be credited to you for 2017. The check date is irrelevant if the check is not received or postmarked by December 31.

Statements for 2017: Statements will reflect all church donations postmarked and received by December 31. You have received an interim yearend statement. Please review it and notify Nancy Bea in the church office of any questions or corrections to be made. In mid-January you will receive your final 2017 contribution record which can be used for tax purposes.

Egiving: Westminster provides you with the opportunity to give electronically, having your contributions debited automatically from your checking or savings account. You can make a single donation or set up a recurring giving plan on the Online Giving page on the church website (www.wpc-alex.org). If you have a recurring giving plan in place and have changed your pledge or giving amount for 2018, don't forget to login to your account and change the amount. 

Looking for ways to serve locally and develop connections inside and outside the church?

Our mission programs work to ensure that our financial giving is paired with hands-on involvement. One way we do this is by providing Mission Liaisons, congregation members who serve as a primary (but not sole) contact and connection point with groups to whom we provide support. Our liaisons serve as bridges between WPC and local agencies, keeping up with their needs and wants and looking for ways to connect the wider church with the communities they serve.

Currently, we are seeking Mission Liaisons for:

- ALIVE (Alexandrians Involved Ecumenically; www.alive-inc.org), the oldest and largest private safety net for Alexandrians living in poverty
- Neighborhood Health (www.neighborhoodhealthva.org), which provides comprehensive primary health care services to 15,000 low-income men, woman and children annually who reside in Alexandria and surrounding communities
- OAR (Offender Aid and Restoration; www.oaronline.org), which supports men and women returning to the community from incarceration.
- We are also looking for new members for the 2018 WPC Community Grant Team (wpcalex.org/westminster-community-grant), as they discern which local agencies will receive grants for projects in the areas of children, hunger, education, shelter and selfsufficiency.
