Luke 12:48

This November finds me with a growing sense of gratitude and Thanksgiving for our church. We are a few months into life in our new Education Building, and it has proven to be a tremendous success. We continue in our gratitude for the many church members who steered the process from start to completion. Members of our Master Planning Committee were especially generous with their time and expertise, and they guided, worked, attended meetings, and sacrificed to make sure the building project succeeded.

There are many features in our new building that I especially appreciate. This sounds so simplistic, but I really like how the lights turn on and off "by themselves." New technology has enabled this feature, so we do not leave lights on all night long anymore (at least not in the new building). In a similar vein, the new locking system allows us to lock the building on a schedule, as well as on our phones from a distance. I know that the new locking system is still a work in progress, and your staff is dedicated to making it as seemless and easy as possible.

exceeded all expectations for our adult education programs. They are spacious and conducive to learning and fellowship. Our adult education program is growing, and we are including more and more people who gather to learn on a Sunday morning.

I could go on and on...about the new building...about the beautifully renovated chapel....about the new Community Room below the chapel...about the new counseling space for the Samaritan Counseling Center...and on and on and on....

What I really want to accentuate repeatedly is the generosity that made the building possible in the first place. I am so grateful for those who had the vision to make it possible, and I am thankful for the donors who gave lovingly and sacrificially. Do you have a greater love for singing than chili? Come join us in song, and you are free to leave as you please!




THINK YOU HAVE A WINNING CHILI RECIPE?

GPC'S PARTNERSHIP WITH THE UPPER PRESBYTERY OF THE PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF GHANA

This past July, the Ghana mission team (Erin Bowden, Beth Brock, Ty Hardin, Molly Miller, and Pastor Susie Wiggins) spent 10 days in the Upper Presbytery. Our previous trip took us to Central and Northern Ghana as we discerned where we felt a partnership would be beneficial to both. We now know through this discernment that supporting Northern Ghana through the Upper Presbytery's efforts is our priority. Our team plans to continue monthly meetings to discern our relationship and involvement so that we are building a lasting, reciprocal relationship.

Please pray for the following areas for our friends in Ghana's Upper Presbytery:

Lay training center- The Upper Presbytery is wanting to purchase 10-20 plots of land to centralize their lay training center in Bolgatanga so that they may better reach all of their congregations and those in service to care for them. This will also help with their evangelism into the northwestern region of Ghana.

<u>Student ministry (university/college level)-</u> The students there are in need of educational and spiritual counseling.

<u>"Go Home Project" at Gambaga-</u> The Presbytery wants to have more engagement with traditional leaders and, importantly, the youth in villages that have had women come to Gambaga accused of being witches. The leaders and youth working in collaboration with health and mental health care workers have been successful. As of our last trip 2 summers ago, 35 women have been able to go home due to these efforts.

<u>Community-based rehabilitation</u>. This center helps those in their communities living with disabilities. One way is training them to have basic computer skills.

<u>The Agricultural Station (co-op)-</u> Discussion with the manager of the station that a silo would extend the life of their sorghum crop.

Many of you have asked how you can help. We are happy to announce that we now have numbers and amounts so that our members can begin making a difference in Northern Ghana. One area that we, as a team, believe GPC can initially make a meaningful difference is to help the Upper Presbytery purchase bicycles. These are used by their caretakers to reach their preaching points or churches. Caretakers travel great distances to reach these and we discovered that the Upper Presbytery only needs 77 more bikes so that every caretaker has one. These bikes can be purchased for \$55 US.

We're excited to begin taking donations for bicycles. If you are interested in making a donation, simply note in the check memo "Ghana Donation." There are so many more ways that we are looking to help....you'll be hearing more from us soon!!



October 4th - Mary Rogers hosted the Ghana Mission Team and their prayer partners - those who prayed with team members before, during, and after their partnership trip to the Upper Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana July 17-27. A significant highlight of the evening was our "surprise" guest, the Reverend James K. Awuni, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Bolgatanga, a Presbyterian Church of Ghana congregation and also the Bolgatanga District Minister and the Director of Finance of the Upper Presbytery, Presbyterian Church of Ghana.

ing the Good N

I love the Acts 1 Church! They were on fire (no pun intended) for the Lord and were unstoppable! They prayed. They preached. They were arrested. And when released went right back to praying and preach-

ing the Good News. Up until this point in Jewish history, the message of the Messiah had only been for the Jews and the nation of Israel. But with the crucifixion of Jesus and their ultimate rejection of God's Son, the Jews made it possible for the Gentiles (this includes us) to have access to this wonderful, marvelous, outstanding Good News!

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be My witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." – Acts 1:8

> When Jesus had told His disciples they would be His witnesses, He specifically named three places they would be doing so - Jerusalem, Judea. Samaria. But where were these places and what did they mean to this young church? And what do they mean for the church now and specifically the special needs ministry of Germantown Presbyterian Church? Let's look at Jerusalem first.

Jerusalem, as the most holy and sacred place, represents our home or the center of the church's activities. The early church spent a lot of time together in each other's homes sharing meals, enjoying fellowship, and sharing their resources and time with each other. For today's Christians our "Jerusalem" is the same. It implies our families and our smaller groups – the people we have the most influence with.



Next, Jesus lists Judea. Judea was the neighborhood where Jerusalem was located. So, after beginning at home, Jesus urges the disciples to go out into their wider neighborhoods to spread the Good News. We share the Good News of Christ when we go into our wider communities to reach others. Where is this place for you? It could

be your school or your job. Or it could literally be in your physical neighborhood.

Lastly, Jesus asks us to go to Samaria. Now it must be noted that the Jews avoided Samaria and saw the Samaritans as outcasts who were not to be trusted. Yet in the Scriptures we read that "Jesus had to go through Samaria" (John 4:4). Why? While Samaria was the most direct route for Jesus to travel from Galilee to Judea, He chose to go to Samaria to encounter the people there. It is the place where we least want to go to meet those who we mistrust or avoid. But Jesus asks us to go out from what is most familiar and comfortable to be with those who are marginalized. Where is Samaria for you?

And then, just to insure no one or no place is left out, Jesus wraps up His charge by adding "...and to the ends of the earth." Enough said. Jesus wants everyone to know about His love for them. For the early church this meant taking on a people group they had yet to meet whose customs and way of life would differ from theirs.

It was through the early church's example found in Acts that the message of salvation found its way outside the walls of Jerusalem (their home) and into Judea (the local

neighborhood) and then into the adjoining region (Samaria) and then beyond to the ends of the earth (think international missions here).

And the special needs ministry of GPC wants to look as much the Acts 1:8 Church as possible. Our Jerusalem is the families within our church walls that have special

needs. They are our family and we have influence over and relationships with them. We love them. We reach them through inclusion in Sunday School and corporate worship when we provide a place for them to learn and to serve alongside us.

Our Judea is the special needs community at large. And we witness to them when we create programming that invites them in to hear the Good News written on the pages of God's Word. We are doing that through Friendship Circle and AMPlify and through our partnership with JoyLife901 when we throw a costume party or host a Breakfast Club.

Samaria may take us out of our comfort zone but we venture out at His leading. Recently, He has opened the doors for us to partner with other special needs communities. This may look like being the guest reader at The Bodine School or leading chapel at Madonna Learning Center. It may be driving down to New Albany, MS and training a group on how to do special needs ministry. We might be outsiders at first, but we quickly gain confidence and new friends as we are obedient.



And then there is the "to the ends of the earth." Last February I had the good fortune to travel to Sierra Leone for two weeks to work with women with disabilities. Talk about going to the ends of

the earth! It was a long trip. But talk about the change, the difference made



- not necessarily in them, but in me! I will never be the same.

GPC, your special needs ministry desires to reflect the Acts 1:8 Church. We do have a Jerusalem, a Judea, and a Samaria. We are reaching the special needs world for Christ!



GPC PRAYER AGAINST VIOLENCE & FOR PEACE

GPC's Session met in September and October, and we had a conversation about violence and what our Christian response to it should be. We were motivated by the mass shootings in Texas, Ohio, and elsewhere.

We are also quite aware that Memphis is currently ranked as one of the most dangerous cities in America with one of the highest violent crime rates in the country. In fact residents have a one in 50 chance of being a victim. We're guessing the high rate of poverty has something to do with these statistics because Memphis has a poverty rate of about 28% which is much higher than the national average of 15%.

This was the backdrop for our conversation. We quickly realized that we all believe in the power of prayer, and we should start making a difference with PRAYER. The Session continues to discuss how we as a church might respond to violence and be peacemakers as the Beatitudes call us to do. The Elders submitted short sentence prayers that were edited together into this larger prayer for our church.

Everyone is invited to take this prayer and please pray it every day for a month.

GPC PRAYER AGAINST VIOLENCE AND FOR PEACE

Almighty God, your name is holy; since the beginning of the world, you have given your loving care, grace, and peace to the world. We pray that you would continue your grace in this time, especially. Who do you need us to be during these times of horrible anger, violence, and hatred?

Guide us in our discernment of GPC's response to your call to be peacemakers in Germantown and the greater Memphis community. Help us to serve others with our talents, spiritual gifts, and financial resources to make a positive difference in the lives of others. We pray for our church to have the wisdom that comes from heaven that we may be pure, peace-loving, considerate, submissive, full of mercy and good fruit, impartial and sincere in our efforts to promote peace in our homes, our neighborhoods, and in the world.

Lord, we also confess. We confess that we are human and sinful, and therefore prone to violence and hatred. Convict us of our sin, and make us aware of how we knowingly and unknowingly add to the eruption of violence and hate in our community. Show us how to bring peace into each interaction and help us bring grace into each conversation.

We pray especially for children growing up in the desperation of poverty and hopelessness. We pray for both mothers and fathers to play active, caring, daily roles in loving and raising their children well. We pray for all children's education, all places of learning, whether at home or in schools, and for all teachers. We pray especially for students and the ability to read early and to read well. We pray for our church's tutoring and mentoring programs. May we be a force for good as we love and teach all children in our path. Protect our schools from violence, we humbly pray.

We praise you and pray for your protection to surround our congregation and greater community in light of tremendous, horrific violence. Help us to be peacemakers, to abhor violence, and to spread hope and love. Lord, we pray that our society will realize the importance of loving one another, both individually and collectively, and that we will commit to solving the issue of violence in our culture.

God of righteousness and peace, when we at GPC say together the words "thy kingdom come," awaken in us a desire to be workers to that end. In the name of the one who desires peace and good will, Jesus Christ, our Lord, the Prince of Peace, who died for the sins of the world. Amen.

Total revenue for September was \$120,596, and with total expenses of \$146,348 we had a deficit for the month of \$25,752. Our year-to-date results also went negative for the month, and our overall deficit for the year is now \$19,646. Deficits during the summer months are expected, and a bright note is in comparison to the YTD deficit in 2018, which was \$72,591.

As we wind up our construction project, we had contributions to *Building Tomorrow Today* of \$39,033 and expenses of \$31,525. At the Session's direction, we paid \$340,000 in excess reserves to our line of credit, reducing our loan outstanding to \$1,990,000.


