

In June we are starting our third month of altered worship and programming due to the COVID-19 virus. As I've said several times to different people: "I must have I skipped class the day in seminary when they taught us how to deal with pandemics!" We are making decisions on a month-bymonth basis, asking for God's wisdom to guide us through uncharted waters as a church. I am so grateful for all of the church members who have offered feedback from our online worship services and for how their own workplaces are advising them in staying healthy as they consider reopening.

The Session has appointed a Coronavirus Recovery and Reopening Task Force (CRRRTF) comprised of medical professionals, staff, deacons, and elders. We are listening to guidance from the Centers for Disease Control, governmental officials, and local experts in containing this virus. We have amassed a great deal of guidance from all over the country, and we are praying for the Holy Spirit to guide us in what we should do in June and July when it comes to holding worship and reopening.

Our perspective starts with the Bible and what God tells us in Scripture. My best place to start is with the Great Commandment to love our neighbors as ourselves. This commandment comes in response to a question posed to Jesus: "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replies by telling the parable of the Good Samaritan, in which the Samaritan helps a stranger who will die without his assistance. The man was unknown to the Samaritan, yet he receives his "neighborly," self-sacrificial love nonetheless.

Who is the "stranger" to you during this Coronavirus pandemic? Do you and I have an obligation to care for strangers/neighbors and love them as we wish to be loved when it comes to a contagious virus? It seems to me that we do – in addition to those we already know and care about on a daily basis. The biggest problem we have is not knowing who is a carrier and who is not; and who might catch the virus from someone who is exposed to me if I'm a carrier. This virus has caused me to go back and reconsider what "love thy neighbor" means when I might infect them or be infected by them with a virus.

I am also relying on another place in scripture about self-sacrificial love: Philippians 2:6-8. This beautiful passage describes how the Son of God humbled Himself for the sake of others. The Son, incarnate in Jesus, was willing to let go of all power and glory and be humiliated on a cross in order to save others. This passage speaks to me greatly about my own attitudes of mission and service toward others, and it reminds me of how pride has no place in the Christian mindset.



As the church leadership decides how to proceed and reopen our church for worship and meetings, we are trying to answer how best to love each other in ways that ensure health and well-being – as well as ways that meet the Biblical commands to worship God as a body and serve Him in the community. I believe there is a balance we can find between resuming worship and staying healthy. It will likely involve subscribing to guidelines that some people will consider unnecessary or "over the top." Such guidelines might include spacing out in the sanctuary, wearing masks in certain parts of the church, and changing worship practices (like not passing offering plates, using hymnals, etc.).

Of course, people around us are quick to politicize everything, such as wearing masks and social-distancing. Wearing a mask has different connotations to people based on their politics and personal preferences, ranging from totally unneccessary to absolutely essential. Right now, it seems like you're either a patriot or a traitor based on whether or not you wear a mask. I hope we can avoid such discourses as we move forward into this summer.

The Bible requires us to worship God (Exodus 20:4-11), and it also commands us to put others' interests ahead of our own (Philippians 2:3-4). Our church is trying to navigate between these two commands from our God. Please continue to pray for our CRRTF, and may God bless you all as you make decisions for you and your loved ones.

CIRCLES OF CARE UPDATE

Update on what the Circles of Care Ministry is doing: This group of "servants of the Lord" are doing ministry in multiple ways:

- Calling those who are the most vulnerable to feel isolated and alone in our family of faith,
- · Writing personal notes, emails, and text messages,
- Preparing meals for those in need.
- Delivering meals,
- Helping with technology support.

Other ways we are staying in constant touch with each other include:

- the Membership Committee is staying in touch with all those who've visited GPC in recent months,
- the Belonging Ministry is contacting our newest members,
- Fellowship Group conveners are staying in touch with their Fellowship Groups,
- Men's Breakfast is meeting virtually every Friday morning and staying in touch with each other,
- Presbyterian Women are staying in contact with their members and the Coordinating Team is meeting virtually,
- Sunday School class conveners are staying in touch with all those who attend their virtual Sunday School classes,
- Friends in Christ are staying in touch with those they would normally visit once each month,
- Erin Bowden stays in touch with the youth,
- Anna White stays in contact with the children and their parents,
- Helen Warren stays in touch with the special needs members.

Pastoral Care is happening, too. Will, Tom, and I are calling members, writing personal notes, emailing, and texting with those in need of pastoral care.

Friends, we want everyone to feel connected to our family of faith! If you are someone – or know of someone – in need of a personal phone call or have another need, please let me know: care@germantownpres.org.

Additionally, God has placed it on my heart to start a new Circles of Care Ministry team, too – a Prayer Circle – a group of people who are praying for those in the greatest need in our midst.

Here is the concept:

- 4-6 people agree to pray confidentially for whomever is in need of prayer and lets one of the Circle of Care Prayer Ministry members know of their need. Confidentially is the key to the success of the Circle of Care Prayer Ministry only the members (and the pastors) know of the need and are praying.
- More than one Circle of Care Prayer Ministry team can be created if we have many that want to participate, each team with 4-6 members.

- Prayer takes place wherever the Circle of Care Prayer Ministry members are in their own homes, usually. The team can also meet virtually if they choose and I can assist in creating a Go To Meeting link for them. Truly, though, the beauty of this ministry is that a Circle of Care and prayer is surrounding the person in need from the comfort of their own homes.
- The needs can be shared via email, phone call, or text. Each team member has only one other person on the ministry team that they contact each time there is a request.
- •The prayer need moves around the Circle until it returns to the original member who received the request. With that call, the Circle of Prayer is complete, and all members are praying for the specific need of the person who requested the prayer.
- Prayers can continue for the specific needs for as long as the person requesting the prayer feels they are in need.
- Circle of Care Prayer Ministry members can check back with the individual to see if the need is ongoing.

Why a Circle of Prayer team:

- To provide another level of care and prayer for members and friends of Germantown Presbyterian Church.
- To provide for a prayer ministry that can be done by anyone.
- To provide an opportunity for involvement in the life of GPC for those who are no longer ambulatory (and often feel as though they have lost their purpose). Oftentimes those who are no longer able to participate in the life of GPC long to have a purpose, and an opportunity to serve on a team such as this would give them a much-needed purpose!

THE IMPORTANCE & THE ART OF JOURNALING

Those who haven't journaled before wonder about the purpose and benefit of journaling. Over many years of journaling, I've discovered both the beauty and a sense of peace that comes with penning your thoughts into the pages of

a journal. It begins with choosing your journal as each time you reach for it, you want to feel the joy of writing in something you've chosen specifically for the purpose of laying down your thoughts, dreams, joys, sorrows, and hopes. I always look for my next journal while continuing to write in my current journal – I want to be ready to move from one to the other with ease and anticipate the new joy that will come because I've chosen the next journal, too. Now, sometimes my journal is a gift from

someone dear, which makes the writing in it even more special. My journal needs to lay flat, and I prefer that it have both an elastic strap and a ribbon bookmark. Finding a journal with all three of these desires is not always possible, but when they do all come to fruition in one journal, I'm a very happy woman. My recommendation is that you look for your own journal, either online, or in a local bookstore, until you find the one that brings you joy just by discovering it.

Next comes preparing to write in your new journal. "Why prepare," you might think? Well, what I've discovered is that I need to set aside some time to journal or it simply does not happen. And, when I open my journal and see that I have not visited it in weeks, then I know that my life has been too much about accomplishing tasks and not enough about spending quality quiet time writing in my journal. And, for me, this usually means that I am also not spending quality quiet time with God, for much of my journaling is written prayer to God.

Much of my journaling, too, is conversations with loved ones who no longer reside on earth with me, but reside instead, in heaven with our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Sometimes I need to speak to them, and journaling is a really good opportunity to do so, just as journaling provides good opportunities to converse with God.

So, the preparation for journaling is about carving out time, and even more it is about allowing journaling to be included in the rhythm of your day, or at the very least the rhythm of your week. Your space to journal needs to include pure quiet or soft instrumental music playing in the background. My current preference is instrumental folk music that I've found as a Pandora station – it is really lovely. Next, choose your pen. Whether you prefer a

fountain pen, roller ball, or gel matters not – what matters is that it feels good in your hand and that it flows nicely from pen to page – so that you enjoy the writing.



So, now you have your journal, your time carved out, your quiet or quiet music, and your pen. You are ready. So, what do you write? If this is your first time, begin with prompting questions for yourself, such as "For what am I grateful today?" You've probably heard of people writing "gratitude journals," so this can be a really good beginning for you. Another idea is to begin in scripture – read the Daily Lectionary scripture passages and then journal your thoughts about them. You can find

both the Daily and the Weekly (Sunday) Lectionary readings on the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) website: https://www.presbyterianmission.org/devotion/daily/. Or, you can read and journal alongside a book or a study, e.g. an Advent or Lenten devotional.

Another very helpful use of journaling is to do so following the death of someone you've loved and lost. When I've done this following the deaths of my husband, my mom, and my best friend (over several years), I've bought a brand new journal that reminds me of them. The one I got to journal after my mom's death, for example, has a big purple flower in the middle of it because she loved both flowers and the color purple. Each time I picked it up I would smile before beginning to converse with her my thoughts, my day, my children, my life, my longing to talk to her in person. I did the same with the other great losses of my life, and I highly recommend this kind of journaling for anyone who has lost a loved one.

Friends, there is no one way to journal for journaling is very personal. It is also very beneficial to our mental health because doing so does indeed bring us peace, calm, and joy.

GPC's GRIEF SUPPORT MINISTRY

Grief is the normal and natural emotional reaction to loss or change of any kind - the conflicting feelings caused by the end of or change in a familiar pattern of behavior.

Over five years ago, GPC began its Grief Support Ministry in an effort to reach out to bereaved individuals within the GPC family and throughout the greater Memphis/Shelby County area. This ministry seeks to provide an emotionally and physically safe environment in which participants can, in the context of community, become better equipped with tools for effectively navigating grief's difficult journey.

Typically the Grief Support Ministry Group meets the second Thursday of each month at 6:00pm in the church parlor. This ministry is open to the public.

Due to the current meeting restrictions in keeping with the CO-VID 19 guidelines, Grief Support has temporarily suspended meeting together until further notice. Those currently in this support group are staying in contact through emails, texts, phone calls, FaceTime.

Special Needs PEACE Ministry

In January, I received an e-mail from Mary Kay Grantham inviting me to join the Special Needs Ministry Support Team. I had recently retired from teaching kindergarten for the Shelby County and Collierville School systems and now had the opportunity to explore other things. I received an e-mail from Will asking me to consider helping with this ministry to give the church some breathing room in order to find a permanent leader. Once I visited with Monica Kirby and attended a Friendship Circle and Amplify session, I knew that this was an area that God wanted me to serve.

One reason I feel drawn to the special needs ministry is not only because I see the great importance for the church, but also because I have personally seen the influence of special needs ministry in my family. Carolyn is my cousin who has Down Syndrome and at the time she was born, the doctors told her parents she would probably never live past her mid-twenties. 52 years later she is still a very active part of the family! She lost her mother when she was 29, and after her dad passed away several years ago, Carolyn went to live with her sister and brother-in-law in Portersville, MS. This was the beginning of the Carolyn visits. Each summer and sometimes other times thoughout the year she comes to stay with our family. She's always smiling, on the go, shaking hands, giving out hugs and making friends. I'll never forget being blown away one day when I took her to the Target in Germantown and a stranger stopped us and said, "I know you - you're Carolyn from Mississippi!"

Carolyn's faith is a very important part of her life. She often tells us and others she comes in contact with "I'm going to pray for you." She will also ask anyone she comes across to pray for her church. When she comes to visit, she always bring her Bible to look through every morning for her devotional time.

As I am now getting to know more about the PEACE Ministry at GPC, I can see what a blessing it must be for special church members like Carolyn. From Friendship Circle, Amplify Music program, Wacky Wednesday, and now Sunday School over Zoom, I have been impressed by all this program entails. Our Sunday School class has actually grown during the quarantine because more participants are able to join from home!

As I step into this interim role, I am very much in awe and appreciative of all the hard work Monica Kirby and others have put into developing such a great program for the special needs community.

I am proud to be part of a congregation that, as I have often heard Monica say, will embrace Carolyn and members of the special needs community as if we are embracing Jesus Himself.





I am a lifelong Presbyterian and married to Lance Warren who has served as a Deacon and Elder here at GPC. We have three daughters Anna, Kaylie, and Leighten. We've been members at GPC for about 14 years. I graduated from Mississippi State with an undergraduate and Master's Degree in Education. I've taught elementary school for 21 years. As an Elder, I am currently serving on the Adult Ed Committee, Elder representative to GPC Preschool, and serve on the Special Needs Support Ministry. I'm looking forward to becoming more deeply involved in GPC's wonderful Special Needs Ministry and working more closely with all of you.

Update from the Missions Leadership Team

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Missions Leadership Team (MLT) recently approved two donations to local organizations that are on the front lines helping to relieve the stress created by the current situation in our community. The MLT approved a donation of \$7,000 to the Mid-South Food Bank as well as a donation of \$5,000 to the Hospitality Hub. One of the MLT's guiding principles is to match monetary contributions with the hands-on efforts of our congregation. We feel these two donations adhere to that principle as GPC members have recently been supporting both of these organizations with their time and labor. Every Thursday for the past two months, approximately 20-25 GPC members have staffed the Mid-South Food Bank's mobile food pantry program, packing up food and distributing it to the needy. In addition, GPC members have provided over 750 meals for those who have been housed and supported in many other ways by the Hospitality Hub, many of whom are also served by Room in the Inn. The MLT wishes to express our heartfelt appreciation for all of our members who have lovingly and selflessly contributed their time, talent, and labor to support those in need in the greater Memphis area.

On another local front, the MLT also approved a \$5,000 donation to the Rising Together Foundation to help support its Summer SLAM program, which we learned about from Judd Peters during the May 17 Moment for Mission. (See more info about that on page 9.) And, further afield, the MLT approved a request from the Ghana Mission Team to donate \$10,000 from the Crook Family Trust funds (designated solely for global missions) to the Upper Presbytery

of Ghana to purchase land for a lay training center. This center will enable the Presbytery to better reach and care for all of its congregations and help with its evangelism efforts in the northwest region of Ghana. Unfortunately, the Ghana Mission Team had to cancel its June trip due to the pandemic. So, the team is now looking at ways it can use its travel budget to help the Upper Presbytery provide COVID-19 relief and enhance its evangelism efforts.

The MLT would like say, "Thank you!" to the GPC congregation for its generosity, which allows these monetary donations in support of God's children near and far to be feasible! If you'd like to be involved with this team and their great efforts, contact Phil Carroll at phillip_carroll@att.net.

Rising Together Foundation

Bridging the Education and Opportunity Gap

Rising Together is dedicated to serving and supporting elementary-, middle-, and highschool students by creating,

administering, and supporting excellent academic, leadership, and social programs and events and to providing necessary financial assistance so that disadvantaged students from under-served communities may participate.

Rising Together promotes high academic, leadership, and character standards and broadens peer relationships among students throughout the greater community. Designed to foster academic preparedness for a group of emerging academic and social leaders, the programs and events develop and connect future leaders of our community. Ultimately, Rising Together strives to introduce all participants to college- and life-preparatory experiences and expectations while promoting inclusive community relationships for a lifetime of leadership and service.

Disadvantaged students in under-served communities often do not receive the support and opportunities needed to become successful students and leaders. As a result in the summer months they experience "summer slide" where they regress academically, physically, and socially. The Rising Together Foundation is dedicated to addressing these challenges by providing excellent college- and life-preparatory programming and events designed for students.

In the summer of 2020 Rising Together anticipates serving approximately 180 disadvantaged students in the Summer SLAM programs (Scholars, Leaders, and Athletes in Memphis) at three locations in the Memphis area: The Neighborhood Christian Center, Star Academy Charter School, and Evangelical Christian School. Rising Together will work with schools and organizations to establish a team of leaders, teachers, coaches, and student leaders who will work at the program locations. These full-day, multi-week programs incorporate the programs listed below.

Features of the Summer SLAM program include:

- · College- and Life-Preparatory Program for Students:
- Academic Enrichment in Language Arts, Writing, Math, and Technology;
- Leadership Development and Public Speaking Courses;
- Physical Fitness, Sports, and Games;
- · Community Relationships, Outreach, and Engagement.

RTF requests help from the GPC family in three ways for the Summer SLAM programs: prayers, people, and purse.

- · Prayers: Pray for the student participants and adults involved. (A specific list of those involved will be provided later.)
- People: Week-by-week committed volunteers are needed to serve as teachers, high school/college students as counselors, and general help is needed serving meals and cleaning up. These decisions can be made a week at a time.
- Purse: Financial contributions are needed to provide scholarships for student participants and to help pay for other costs of the programs.

Pike Yoga Studio offers yoga classes and personal training, and Wendy also trains and teaches yoga. Pike offers a variety of classes - some of their best sellers are: Yoga 101, Gentle Yoga and Yin.

Personal training is available in both private and group sessions. Last year, Pike started a joint venture with Wendy's cousin, Jordan Carver. They own and operate Pike Yoga Online Studio. This is a subscription-based service (\$16/month), and you can cancel at anytime. The online studio has cardio, strength, and yoga workouts. You can filter the selection based on time, type, and teacher. The online studio is a great alternative for home workouts and an especially great option while staying safer at home.







Sunday, June 28 > Sandy Franks and Marcus King


Alex will of course be with us on the organ and piano.

Revenues exceeded expenses in April by almost \$25,000, which is a real tribute to the strong stewardship of GPC. After 4 months of 2020 (33% of the year), our total revenue is at 40% of our budget. Expenses are on target at 32%. The summer months are normally our low point for contributions as our members take vacations and are otherwise occupied with outdoor activities. This year, the coronavirus has complicated the picture even more. None of us has been through anything even close to this, and we really don't know what to expect. This is why continuing our stewardship habit is even more important.

Thank you for all you've done for GPC and for all you're going to do as we work through this crisis together.
