Dear GPC Members and Friends,

As we begin another program year during this month of August, I approach you with eagerness and trepidation. At the same time, I am so excited about and so uncertain about how this next year will proceed. Never before in my career as a minster have I approached a church program year with such an entrepreneurial spirit all around me in our staff and membership. Usually, the church year is programmed with an anticipated rhythm of how things will proceed, and we rarely deviate from our patterns and schedules over the course of a year. We know what will happen in the fall, and we are rarely surprised by much as we move into the holiday season, especially as we gear up for Christmas and all of its beautiful busy-ness. Have we grown too comfortable? Perhaps....

Maybe God is inviting (inspiring) us to shake things up a little bit. In the last few months, we have learned to throw many expectations out the window, and we have lost (or rather postponed) many of our traditions and practices. We have adapted to circumstances we never would have chosen. We know this is not unique to churches: so many of your small and large businesses have had to adjust to circumstances that have wreaked havoc on your incomes and routines. As a church, we have learned to lean on God in ways that are new and difficult...and that are a blessing!

God is answering and blessing our desire to remain faithful to the Spirit's leading. As we approach this new season in our church life, I am reminded of the Scripture passage from Isaiah where God declares a fresh approach for His people: "I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert" (Isaiah 43:19). God spoke these words to a weary people who had been in exile for many years. They were isolated from the familiar settings of their homeland, and they were wondering about what their future would hold. Would God be faithful? Would they ever return to "normal?" Will they see a better day than the present?

As we look out into our future, I believe that God intends to bless us by doing new things among us. We have glimpses of what the next year will look like. In all of our planning, we are anticipating that the status quo will remain for one year regarding Covid-19. Until there is mass-immunity or a vaccine, we will have limited worship attendance, smaller onsite Sunday School classes and Bible studies, increased online groups and studies, and more live-streaming of the morning traditional worship service and the evening contemporary service (coming in September). We will not be



physically present with each other as much, but is it not possible that God will lead us into deeper and better relationships — first and foremost with God and also with each other? It is during exactly these kinds of times that God causes us to grow, be better, deepen our faith, and increase our love.

To respond to God's leading, we are relying heavily on prayer and inspiration, and we are praying for God to be creative among us. We are hoping that our church members will respond to new ways of being the church in service to the world and new ways of learning about God's will for our lives. I believe we will rise to the challenge — and a great challenge it will be! Here are some that I see: how to teach children and youth who are not adapting well to "social distancing" (but who is?); how to help older adults plug in to unfamiliar technology; how to worship when we're mostly online; how to minister to our isolated, sick, and older members..... and the list goes on.

The challenges are mighty—but God's power is stronger than all challenges. God's grace is sufficient in all of our personal and communal weaknesses, and God will bless us if we stay prayerful and faithful. Children and youth will learn the faith, adults will experience the blessing of growing, and our church will emerge stronger and better than we've ever been. In the 180plus years of GPC, God has been faithful and seen us through many difficult times, and I believe 2020 will prove to be another beautiful chapter God is writing in the life of our church.

May God bless you this summer and fall as you find new ways to love God and neighbor for the sake of Jesus Christ.

Evening Bible study options will be offered in the fall, so watch GPC social media and all other publications for information on those opportunities as soon as plans are made for them.

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

New GPC Book Study: Debby Irving's "Waking Up White and Finding Myself in the Story of Race," (Cambridge, MA: Elephant Room Press, 2014, ISBN 978-0-9913313-0-7).

Irving writes of her own personal recollections of her experiences of being an American white woman and coming to terms with the complexity of race in the United States.

Pastor Susie says, "This was me, too. I grew up in the 1950s and 1960s and the photo on the cover of the book could easily be me – blonde curly-haired girl child. Studying and learning about racism has caused me to step out of my comfort zone, and to grow in empathy for my brothers and sisters of color. I've had to be vulnerable, but doing so has given me new strength and confidence in who I am as a human being and follower of Jesus Christ. I invite you to join me in this journey as we learn more about race and racism together. I promise we will create a safe space for rich conversation."


He is an avid Arsenal soccer fan. His hobbies include music, traveling, and spending time at the lake house with his grandchildren.

Within the GPC website you can find he GPC Blog. "What is he GPC Blog?" you may ask. It is another means for GPC to communicate and connect with those who visit our website. Presently you will find daily writings on blog. These are like the daily devotions that I began to write before the 2020 COVID-19 Global Pandemic. That is, on Ash Wednesday, I began a 54-day daily devotion and accompanying journal on "Lent and Easter from the Wisdom of Henri Nouwen" (complied by Judy Bauer, Ligouri, MO: Ligouri Publications, 2005). Following this study, I began a new series of daily devotions that I titled a "Study of Time; our relationship to time," using as a primary resource Dorothy C. Bass' "Receiving the Day: Christian Practices for Opening the Gift of Time," (San Francisco, CA: Jossey-Bass, 2000). I wrote these daily devotions until Pentecost, and afterwards began another study on "the church" - who we are as the people of God and who God calls us to be. Presently, I am writing on "The church - Lament to Hope" - how we journey through lament to find hope again as the people of God.

All of these daily devotions are posted each morning on the Pastor Susie Wiggins Facebook page as "Morning Blessings." Many of those who visit our GPC website, however, do not have Facebook and so miss out on the "Morning Blessings" daily devotions there. The GPC Blog, then, provides an additional resource for these daily devotions for a different population of our followers.

I hope you will find these writings meaningful and that they will, in turn, provide meaningful personal reflections for you. I would love to hear from you as you read and reflect on them. How are they causing "stirrings" in your soul? How is God speaking through them to you? How do you feel called to respond to God's calling on your own life as you read and reflect? Germantown Ministers Offer A Joint Statement

The ministers of New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church, Germantown United Methodist Church, Germantown Presbyterian Church, Kingswav Christian Church, and St. George's Episcopal, neighbors and partners in Christ's service for decades, recently gathered to discuss matters regarding racial unrest, inequity, inequality, and injustice present in our culture and society. We also discussed the great progress our country has made in racial reconciliation and civil rights and all of the many good things that have happened over the long years of faithful witness by Christ's church against racism. We also voiced our appreciation and support for police officers and elected leaders and the good they do every day, and we are grateful for police officers, emergency responders, and military members who sacrifice so much to protect us in the face of immense danger and threats to their lives every day. Together we crafted a single statement, speaking with one voice, as brothers and sisters in Christ who follow in the footsteps of Jesus Himself who stood against oppression in the first century and whose mission included lifting up all those who are oppressed in any way.

We stand together.

We, the ministers of New Bethel Missionary Baptist Church, St. George's Episcopal Church, Kingsway Christian Church, Germantown Presbyterian Church, and Germantown United Methodist Church serve churches who have been neighbors and partners in Christ's service for many decades. We represent a people diverse in race and creed, and our churches have intentionally come together for conversations, worship, and fellowship for the last six years.

Today, in our nation's time of strife, we continue to stand together:

We stand together as brothers and sisters in Christ: • for treating every person with full human rights, respect, and dignity of being created in the image of God;

• for abolishing any systematic forms of racism;

• and for the persons who have been victimized by racism,

• acknowledging the pain, grief, and anger that it has caused.

We stand together for the witness of scripture:

• to act justly, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with God, as Micah prophesied;

• to seek accord through the bond of peace in one body and one Spirit, as Paul taught;

• to love one another and be known by that love, as Christ said His followers would do.

We stand together for unity in Christ:

•through the building of relationships;

• through conversations that seek understanding;

• and through intentional efforts of racial reconciliation.

We stand together for all those in civil authority:

• who would faithfully serve the community in fairness and equity; and

• we ask for intentional training, oversight, and transparency of civil authority to ensure equal protection of all under the law.

We commit ourselves to continue these efforts, and invite those of like mind and heart to join us, as we seek the love and welfare of all humanity, to the glory of God.

When we lament, we move from suffering to faith. In our faith there is hope. We lament in order to hope. Recovering lament may be one of the church's most timely gifts to the world. Explore lament with PW!

Our PEACE program has many terrific participants.There is no better way to see the value of the PEACE program than to get to know those that attend!

It's hard not to love Tim. His smile and happy personality is infectious! Tim lives in Bartlett with his dad, step mom and his black lab, Buddy, who is his best friend. He is 32 years old and the youngest of three siblings. His brother and 2 nieces live in Nashville, and his sister lives in Collierville.

Tim went to Madonna Learning Center and Adult Program for 20 years, and graduated in May 2016.

His favorite color is Memphis Tiger Blue, and you can find him wearing a University of Memphis shirt or Memphis blue just about every day. One of the things I wanted to learn about Tim was, "How did he get to be such a huge University of Memphis fan?" Here's his stepmom, Shelia's, response. THE SPECIAL NEEDS MINISTRY SUPPORT TEAM IS LOOKING FOR A NEW DIRECTOR

The Director of Special Needs Ministry is responsible for developing, implementing, and supervising the PEACE Program of GPC. PEACE stands for the Place where Exceptional Adults and Children are Embraced. This position is a part-time, 12 month-ayear, salaried position averaging 25 hours per week.

We would like to ask for your help. First, we ask for your prayers to help guide us in finding the right person to lead our PEACE program. Secondly, we ask that you help us communicate this position. You may

Director of Special Needs Ministry

<u>Description:</u> The Director of Special Needs Ministry is responsible for developing, implementing, and supervising the PEACE Program of GPC. PEACE stands for the Place where Exceptional Adults and Children are Embraced.

This position is a part-time, 12-montha-year, salaried position averaging 25 hours per week. Included in these hours are Sunday and Wednesday services and weekly meetings with the whole staff and program staff. This position works along with the pastoral staff, program staff, and support staff to ensure that persons with special needs are ministered to in the most effective ways possible.

The Director of Special Needs Ministry will be expected to lead program volunteers effectively with the support of the SNMST to accomplish the total ministry. The Director of Special Needs Ministry will be responsible for the programs under this position, while empowering volunteers to help lead the ministry.

The Director of Special Needs Ministry reports directly to the Senior Pastor.

Experience: A minimum of 5 years in special needs ministry, either in a leadership or lead volunteer role. Or, in the alternative, a degree in special education or a related field would be accepted.

The person in this role will have a mature faith in Jesus Christ and an ability to articulate how his or her relationship with God is maintained over time. This ministry director will work well with other staff members as a team player and will seek to love and minister to all people. This person will seek to integrate into a wide variety of aspects of church life.

Responsibilities

• Know special needs students and the special needs ministry.

• Maintain a fresh approach to special needs and special needs ministry. The Director of Special Needs Ministry will be expected to pursue current field information that will help develop and advance the ministry, as well as attend professional special needs training conferences/conventions.

• Provide ministry care to special needs students and their families. Counsel special needs students and their families when needed. Visit students when they are injured or have a major illness. Support students involved in team or individual activities (e.g., sports, recitals, etc.) whenever possible.

- Develop and maintain ministry budget.
- Maintain supplies necessary for the various ministry programs.

• Recruit and train volunteers for the ministry.

• Lead a robust Sunday School for students with special needs, which includes: expanding leadership of teachers, recruiting and ongoing training of teachers, curriculum ordering and distribution, outreach, and creating new classes as needed.

• Expand the ministry, which includes: develop and implement joint ministry opportunities for the PEACE Program. This would apply to Sundays and Wednesday evenings, and other days as needed when acting in conjunction with other ministries.

Programs

Maintain regularly-scheduled programming (e.g., including but not limited to Wacky Wednesdays, Amplify, Breathe [Parents Night Out] and Friendship Circle).

• Community Involvement

Seek out and develop community relationships as opportunities arise.

Communications

Prepare at least one article for the church newsletter (The Window) per month. Regularly review the church website to make sure all materials regarding the Special Needs Ministry are up to date. Create brochures/flyers or other materials to distribute to the community.

PEACE Program Special Events

Plan, promote, market and conduct special events (e.g., Special Needs Emphasis Sunday, guest speakers, performances or conferences).

Vacation Bible School ("VBS")

In the event any elementary-aged student(s) with special needs wish to attend VBS, the Director of Special Needs Ministry will work in conjunction with the Director of Children's Ministries and/or VBS Coordinator to adapt any activities as needed.

• Parent/Caregiver Support Group

Maintain an active dialogue with the facilitator(s) of the parent/caregiver support group, and assist as needed in developing discussion material. Pray regularly over the group's participants.

Comfort and Care Ministry

Maintain a ministry with parents who are expecting the birth of a special needs child, whose children are recently diagnosed with a special need, and who need ongoing encouragement necessary for these families.

- Germantown Presbyterian Preschool ("GPP") Provide GPP with resources regarding relevant special needs, programs, therapies or events.
- Other duties as agreed upon by the ministry team and/or Senior Pastor.

Rising Together is dedicated to serving and supporting elementary-, middle-, and high-school students by creating, administering, and supporting excellent academic, leadership, and social programs and events, and to providing necessary financial assistance so that disadvantaged students from under-served communities may participate.

Rising Together promotes high academic, leadership, and character standards and broadens peer relationships among students throughout the greater community. Designed to foster academic preparedness for a group of emerging academic and social leaders, the programs and events develop and connect future leaders of our community. Ultimately, Rising Together strives to introduce all participants to college- and life-preparatory experiences and expectations while promoting inclusive community relationships for a lifetime of leadership and service.

Disadvantaged students in under-served communities often do not receive the support and opportunities needed to become successful students and leaders. As a result in the summer months they experience "summer slide" where they regress academically, physically, and socially. The Rising Together Foundation is dedicated to addressing these challenges by providing excellent college- and life-preparatory programming and events designed for students.

In the summer of 2020 Rising Together anticipates serving approximately 180 disadvantaged students in the Summer SLAM programs (Scholars, Leaders, and Athletes in Memphis) at three locations in the Memphis area: The Neighborhood Christian Center, Star Academy Charter School, and Evangelical Christian School. Rising Together will work with schools and organizations to establish a team of leaders, teachers, coaches, and student leaders who will work at the program locations. These full-day, multi-week programs incorporate the programs listed below.

Features of the Summer SLAM program include:

- College- and Life-Preparatory Programs for Students;
- Academic Enrichment in Language Arts, Writing, Math, and Technology;
- Leadership Development and Public Speaking Courses;
- Physical Fitness, Sports, and Games;
- Community Relationships, Outreach, and Engagement.

RTF requests help from the GPC family in three ways for the Summer SLAM programs: prayers, people, and purse.

• <u>Prayers</u>: Pray for the student participants and adults involved. (A specific list of those involved will be provided later.)

• <u>People</u>: Week-by-week committed volunteers are needed to serve as teachers, high school/college students as counselors, and general help is needed serving meals and cleaning up. These decisions can be made a week at a time.




What Are GPCKids Doing This Year on Sunday Mornings?



We achieved a small surplus in June of \$6,955 bringing our total surplus to almost \$137,000 through June. We continue to outperform our 2019 results but our program expenses have been reduced to a minimum since March. Thank you to all who have adapted to the current environment by giving online.

The Stewardship Team has extended the *Building Tomorrow Today* campaign through the end of 2020 in order to give those

whose finances have been disrupted by the pandemic an opportunity to complete their pledges. We still have pledges of just over \$343,000 outstanding, and every dollar received between now and the end of the year will go to service the existing debt on our new building. We anticipate a loan balance of approximately \$1.5 million at the end of the year when these pledges are received and excess reserves are applied to the loan balance as approved by the Session.
