Clerk's Corner... by Sally Robinson, PSV Stated Clerk

This week your congregation's Clerk of Session received an instruction sheet and form from me and Marquell Segelken from the Presbytery Commission for Congregational Life for preparing the church Session minutes to be read later on this year. Certain things are required to be in all Session minutes, just as certain things are required to be in all presbytery minutes. I say all this because I am fascinated by church Session minutes. They are an historical record of a particular congregation, its members and mission activities, its joys and sorrows, its hallelujah moments and its times of repentance. Because

Valley and the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Through months of listening sessions, conversations, correspondence, study, prayers and discernment, the Commission determined there was a scism in this congregation and no reconciliation was possible. Through Presbytery action at the September 2018 Meeting, the Commission was authorized to administer the plan of division of these two congregations, dismiss the original NAPC to the Evangelical Presbyterian Church denomination, and establish the new Rose Run Presbyterian Church. This new congregation would regain the original New Albany Church building by September 2019. During the February 19 Presbytery Meeting, the Commission was dismissed with gratitude for their expert work. What Presbyterians Believe about Nature... By Reverend Susan DeGeorge, Stated Clerk, Hudson River Presbytery

Presbyterians come from a tradition that calls us to know, honor, rejoice in and care for God's creation. Our Scripture - from Genesis to Revelation - invites us to be in relationship with trees that clap their hands, as Isaiah proclaims; water that quenches thirst, cleanses,



teaches about justice and quiets our anxiety; and animals that serve as helpers, partners and teachers. Our belief is centered on the Word becoming flesh - physical matter. John Calvin, one of the forefathers of the Reformed tradition, viewed nature as an important source of knowledge of God, awakening us to God's presence in our daily lives and, thus, is worthy of our care. For decades now, the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has called us to be involved in and care for creation. Most recently, the 223rd General Assembly (2018) asked us to "raise a prophetic

I am fascinated by church history, in the years when I was a transitional pastor, I always read not just immediate past minutes of a church, but their earlier minutes as well. I wanted to know how and why a church was founded, what some of the earliest days were like, and how they grew or declined over the decades. If you are fairly new to your church, or if you're not sure about its history, ask to read some of the earliest session minutes. What you learn will be fascinating, and perhaps shed some new light on your congregation for you.

voice regarding the urgency of healing the climate of the earth, our home and God's gift for the future of all life, human and nonhuman". If we are to live what it is we say we believe as Presbyterians, our challenge is twofold. First, we must develop new, strong relationships with the rest of creation by providing occasions to immerse ourselves in the beauty and the mystery of creation in our congregational worship and in our daily lives. We might learn where the water in our baptism services and the bread and juice shared during the Lord's Supper come from, and how the earth or rivers from which they were gathered connect to us and have been treated by us. We might provide occasions for those in our worshiping communities to take off their shoes and stand on the earth, literally as well as figuratively, recognizing the holiness of the ground on which we stand. We might gather on a dark night and look up at the stars, counting them and remembering God's promise to Abraham and all his descendants. Then, having strengthened our connections with creation, we must tend to those relationships through our daily choices - in what we consume, how we get from place to place, and how we treat the beings around us, along with the water, soil and air. Only then will we begin to embody Mark's Gospel commission to go into all the world and proclaim the good news to all creation.
