My husband and I received a new daily devotional this past holiday season, New

Morning Mercies by Paul David Tripp. Even before beginning the devotions, the introduction piqued my attention and memory as it talked both about mercy and grace so before we took off on a winter trip south for a few weeks, I grabbed my copy of *What's So Amazing About Grace*? by Philip Yancey, a book I poured over twenty years ago, and began rereading it.

Following Advent, Christmas and Epiphany seasons and embarking on a new calendar year seems like a perfect time to revisit the enormous topic of grace. I remembered my computer screensaver from years past which defined grace as "getting what I don't deserve" and mercy as "not getting what I deserved." Two sides of the same coin? I'll let you decide. Trip says "As the themes of grace get more familiar and common, they don't capture my attention and awe as they once did. When amazing realities of the gospel quit commanding your attention, your awe, your worship, other things in your life will capture your attention instead. When you quit celebrating grace, you begin to forget how much you need grace, and when you forget how much you need grace, you quit seeking the rescue and strength that only grace can give."

Yancey says that "grace means there is nothing I can do to make God love me more and nothing I can do to make God love me less." Now these are ideas to meditate on to start the year. Here are a few more from Yancey:

- Grace does not depend on what we have done for God but rather what God has done for us.
- Grace is not about finishing last or first; it is not about counting, we receive grace as a gift as a gift from God, not as something we toil or earn.....in the realm of grace the word deserve does not even apply.
- You need not be a Christian to build houses, feed the hungry, or heal the sick. There is only one thing the world cannot do. It cannot offer grace.
- The Buddhist eight-fold path, the Hindu doctrine of karma, the Jewish covenant, and Muslim code of law – each of these offer a way to earn approval. Only Christianity dares to make God's love unconditional.
- The gospel of grace begins and ends with forgiveness. Forgiveness is an act of faith. By forgiving another, I am trusting that God is a better justice-maker than I am. By forgiving, I release my own right to get even and leave all issues of fairness for God to work out. I leave in God's hands the scales that must balance justice and mercy.
- The strongest argument in favor of grace is the alternative, a world of ungrace. The strongest argument for forgiveness is the alternative, a permanent state of unforgiveness.
- ...a new rule of grace: "We're all oddballs, but God loves us anyhow."
- Repentance, not proper behavior or even holiness, is the doorway to grace. And the opposite of sin is grace, not virtue.
- Grace teaches us that God loves us because of who God is, not because of who we are. Categories of worthiness do not apply.

I hope some idea in these excerpts makes you stop and think about our God of grace and mercy and who we are as Christians.

One last thought...is your church a place of grace or ungrace? What would an outsider, a visitor, experience in your church? Pettiness, rudeness, division? Or graciousness, hospitality, forgiveness, unity?

Goal 5: Gender equality



• End all forms of discrimination against all women and girls everywhere.

• Eliminate all forms of violence against all women and girls in the public and private spheres, including trafficking and sexual and other types of exploitation.

- Eliminate all harmful practices, such as child, early and forced marriage and female genital mutilation.
- Recognize and value unpaid care and domestic work through the provision of public services, infrastructure and social protection policies and the promotion of shared responsibility within the household and the family as nationally appropriate.
- Ensure women's full and effective participation and equal opportunities for leadership at all levels of decision making in political, economic and public life.
- Ensure universal access to sexual and reproductive health and reproductive rights as agreed in accordance with the Program of Action of the International Conference on Population and Development and the Beijing Platform for Action and the outcome documents of their review conferences.
- Undertake reforms to give women equal rights to economic resources, as well as access to ownership and control over land and other forms of property, financial services, inheritance and natural resources, in accordance with national laws.
- Enhance the use of enabling technology, in particular information and communications technology, to promote the empowerment of women.
- Adopt and strengthen sound policies and enforceable legislation for the promotion of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls at all levels.

Ending all discrimination against women and girls is not only a basic human right, it's crucial for sustainable future; it's proven that empowering women and girls helps economic growth and development.

United Nations Development Program has made gender equality central to its work and we've seen remarkable progress in the past 20 years. There are more girls in school now compared to 15 years ago, and most regions have reached gender parity in primary education.

But although there are more women than ever in the labor market, there are still large inequalities in some regions, with women systematically denied the same work rights as men.

Sexual violence and exploitation, the unequal division of unpaid care and domestic work, and discrimination in public office all remain huge barriers. Climate change and disasters continue to have a disproportionate effect on women and children, as do conflict and migration.

It is vital to give women equal rights, land and property, sexual and reproductive health, and access to technology and the internet. Today there are more women in public office than ever before but encouraging more women leaders will help achieve greater gender equality.

What can we do in our everyday lives to work toward these goals?
