Columbus Indianola Presbyterian Church



Indianola Presbyterian

Church was built in 1916 in the Iuka Avenue gorge on a spot that had once been a favorite swimming hole for the local persons. It was founded originally in 1909 at the strong urging of the president of Ohio State University, Dr. William Thompson.

The Indianola congregation has been one to try new things. It is the first church in Columbus to sponsor a nursery school and the first church to hire a woman minister. The church has also nurtured a number of women as candidates for the ministry. From the beginning, the church has placed emphasis on ministry to university students, faculty, and staff. As a church at the crossroads of the OSU campus and community, it strives to be a creative center, offering an alternative to empty secularism and to religious rigidity.

This congregation's mission statement declares that the congregation is committed to embracing the mystery of faith, social Columbus Old First Presbyterian Church



In 1805 the General Assembly sent Dr. James Hoge as an itinerant missionary to Ohio. The First Presbyterian Church, the first church in Columbus, was formally organized February 8, 1806. Dr. Hoge served as pastor for over 50 years.

Louis Sullivant, a founding member, built a small brick chapel on River Street where a cemetery still exists. In 1812 the U.S. Army took over the chapel to store grain which pushed out the walls. In 1821 members of the congregation donated the money to build a place of worship at Town and Front Streets. In 1830 a church building was built at Third and State Streets. In 1900 the church moved to the suburban area at Ohio Avenue and Bryden road, where the church stands today. When two Presbyterian denominations united in the 1950's, Columbus suddenly had two First Presbyterian Churches. The First United Presbyterian Church at Bryden and Ohio became Old First Presbyterian Church.

Old First has provided unique leadership in the Columbus area and continues to carry out its motto: A CHURCH OUT OF YESTERDAY - PROCLAIMING TRUTH OF TODAY - IN WAYS AS NEW AS TOMORROW.

As part of our Matthew 25 initiative, the PC(USA) has named Seven Marks of vital congregations. The first is *Lifelong Discipleship Formation*. Following Christ means being transformed, dving to one

We do not imagine that we have learned everything we need to know in a kindergarten Sunday School class. The Church equips human beings for living in such a way that our neighbors and all of creation are enriched as, together in love-driven communities, we bear Christ's love and power into the world.

One year for the children's sermon during the Easter worship service, I created an "Easter Scripture" basket. Inspired by the chocolate bunnies and lambs and marshmallow Peeps I saw in the store, I began thinking about what Scripture passages would go with the confectionery creations. When I spotted a chocolate rabbit with exaggerated long ears, I thought about the passage in Isaiah 55:3: "Incline your ear and come to me." And when I saw the foil-wrapped lambs it was John 10:11 that I heard: "I am the good shepherd." I put the basket together with the candy and



corresponding Bible verses, and I shared with the children the Good News of Jesus and why Easter is more than just egg hunts and goodies in a basket. With virtual worship still a reality for many congregations this Easter, consider inviting families to create their own baskets or assemble baskets to be given to families.


Continuing Guidance for our PSV Congregations
