

**Presbyterian Women
in the Presbytery of Scioto Valley
will gather Saturday, February 26, 2022
via Zoom**

Seeking Shalom Through Justice and Peace.

The PWPSV Winter Gathering is scheduled for February 26, 2022 beginning at 9:30 a.m. through Zoom technology. Rev. Susan K. Smith, founder of Crazy Faith Ministries, is the main speaker; she will discuss her book "With Liberty and Justice for Some: The Bible, the Constitution, and Racism in America."

The Gathering will also feature justice and peace projects from PSV congregations. Barbara Marshall will discuss Covenant's work in antihuman trafficking; Jayne Elgin from Mifflin Presbyterian will talk about the church's work with refugee families; and Ann B. Walker of Bethany Presbyterian will describe their long history providing a Saturday lunch program that addresses food insecurity and the need for community.

The Gathering will open with devotions to be given by Vann Rogers, PWPSV Vice-Moderator for Study and Spiritual Development. It will also include a small group breakout session and a business meeting to approve the proposed 2022 budget.



TO REGISTER FOR THE GATHERING

Women wishing to attend the Zoom-based Winter Gathering should register by February 24 by submitting their name, the name of their church (including city), phone number, and email address to Martha Pool via email (preferred) mjpool53@gmail.com or by calling and leaving a voicemail message at 740-407-1708. A Zoom invitation will be emailed no sooner than 24 hours prior to the gathering. If more than one person will be sharing your Zoom broadcast, you may include their names, if you know when you register. The Zoom meeting can be accessed with video and audio using pc, iPad, or smartphone and even by the old-fashioned way (audio only), by calling on a phone (toll charges may apply).

From our moderator.....

Following an especially energetic and enlightening CT meeting in January in which a serious discussion arose over the treasurer's report and the subsequent proposed budget for 2022 (see both later in this newsletter), I want to issue a challenge to each reader. But before I state that challenge, let me set it in a certain context.

45 years ago, when I was asked to join a circle (Alpha Zeta) at the Bremen-Bethel Presbyterian Church, you would never have heard me ever imagining being moderator of PW/PSV in my lifetime. Yes, I had a mother and grandmother who were active within their own circles but I can honestly say I never really heard why they belonged or what they got out of belonging. Or if they said, I failed to pay attention. Being asked to join a circle was the meager first step to my long involvement with PW. I was nurtured, encouraged, supported and challenged to lead Bible study, to speak in front of groups, to learn about PW, and to work on mission projects among other things all while working outside the home. When I subsequently changed churches, I was instrumental in pulling a circle together at Rushcreek P.C. and I gave them the nurture, encouragement, support and challenges that I had received myself at Bremen. And it was a fruitful venture.

I've been at First P.C. in Lancaster for not quite 20 years and have had a harder time getting women to be involved in PW. Some of that is historical, ideas that rooted before I arrived. Somewhere along the line they shrank from seven circles to the one and only circle that exists currently. Women in my church engage in Bible study, mission work and care about the needs of our community. And women are certainly in various leadership positions within the church.

So, what is different? Why is it harder to get women involved with PW? There are all kinds of answers to that and we have certainly asked those questions over the last 20 years at various levels of PW. On an individual level, there are so many variables and situations. I reflect on my story and my involvement and know that others saw more potential in my future than I saw myself, but am I looking for that with women in this time and place? Am I looking for women who need PW, who need to be nurtured, encouraged, supported and challenged to be all that they can be? Am I telling my story of how much I have gotten and still get out of PW so that others will clamor to join my circle or attend PW gatherings, how I have made such wonderful friends in PW, how I've found a way to help those who are in need in my community and across the world through mission projects and justice and peace initiatives, how my world has grown from my little community to a global level, and how I have grown spiritually through prayer and Bible study, just to name a few?

So with some of my story shared, here is my challenge to you: Tell one other person (or more if you are so moved) why you are involved with PW, what PW has given you, and what you have done through PW. Invite them to join your circle and invite them to our Winter Gathering via Zoom. Challenge them to taste us and see how good we are! I believe we don't tell our stories often enough and loud enough. And so I challenge you (as well as myself) to tell **your** PW story.

During our CT meeting on January 8th, I was in charge of the devotions.

I can't believe that Christmas is over! The days after Christmas should not be sad or a downer! We just sang "Joy to the World"! But that's the way I was feeling. My Christmas tree fell down/fell over on New Year's Day morning! I put away my presents, I mopped up the spilled water. I swept up the broken ornaments. Now I have to take down the Nativity scene. It's too soon for Christmas to be over! Oh yeah, then there's the cold, snowy, dreary January! I feel incomplete. Christmas—and the anticipation that comes with it—suddenly felt far, far (350+ days far) away!

Adam R. Holz writes that a few years ago, as he was putting his Christmas stuff away, he realized:

"No matter what the calendar says, we're always one day closer to the next Christmas."

I like the sound of that! Not "far" but "closer".

As Christians, our Christmas celebration is based on one spiritual truth and one spiritual reality:

1. The salvation the Baby in the manger brought into this world and 2. The hope for His return.

The Bible tells us that we are watching, waiting, longing and hoping for Christ's second coming. The reality that "our citizenship is in heaven" (Philippians 3:20) changes everything, including what we hope for AND how we live. That hope is strengthened and fortified by the knowledge that with every passing day, we are indeed one day closer to Jesus' return. One day closer to the next Christmas.


I remembered that when I was young, our Christmas decorations stayed up for at least a week after Christmas. So, when my tree fell down, it seemed that Christmas 2021, ended too soon. Why did I feel so incomplete?

After the Zoom meeting was over, I realized that I was waiting for the Magi! I was waiting for the Wise Men to visit the Baby in the manger! (Matthew 2) I had an epiphany! Some churches celebrate January 6th as The Day of Epiphany. I learned that the word EPIPHANEIA is Greek and is translated to mean "appearance" or "manifestation". Christmas is the appearance of Christ to the world as represented by the Magi.

Other words for epiphany are insight, inspiration, discovery, revelation, awakening or eye opener. The opposite of an epiphany is confusion and ignorance. When something suddenly becomes clear, it is an epiphany. I had experienced a sudden realization! The way I felt must have been what the Magi felt when they brought Him gifts! Jesus has come!



PW/PSV MISSION PROJECT – Lynn Coons, VM for Mission

Aka “Bucks for Books...and Games!”

We’ve done it – and we’re still doing it! We – all of us together! – gave (drum roll please!) (now sit down!) \$4,116.00! That’s right - \$4,116.00!!! Yes, you read that correctly - \$4,116.00 to provide lots of books and bookmarks, games, and Cheryl’s Cookies to FIVE of the detention centers that serve youth in our Presbytery. Originally, we thought we could only serve three – Perry Multi-County Juvenile Facility in New Lexington, Multi-County Juvenile Detention Center in Lancaster, and Ross County Juvenile Detention Center in Chillicothe. However, with the beautiful, beneficent gifts you made, it quickly became clear that we could also serve Central Ohio Youth Center in Marysville and Franklin County Juvenile Detention Center in Columbus. This project has truly become presbytery-wide!



Accordingly, we bought over 125 books (see bookplate sample above) and a good selection of games and balls while Cheryl’s Cookies **donated** four boxes of 100 individually wrapped cookies for New Lexington, Lancaster, Chillicothe, and Marysville. Unfortunately, we received the list from FCJDC too late to sort and sift and purchase their books so that will be accomplished before the end of January.



The following Monday, the 20th, Martha and Steve drove to Marysville to bring your gifts to the young people there! Theirs had been the least detailed list of books so we cobbled together a lovely bunch of books and games and they were thrilled with our munificence! The joy you brought to the four Detention Centers we were able to serve before Christmas was palpable as can be seen through these pictures taken at Lancaster and Chillicothe. The Search Committee has begun the work of identifying women to share the warm friendship experienced by member of the Presbytery PW Coordinating Team. It is difficult to decide what you might have to contribute without some idea of what the various positions involve. Below you will find brief summaries of the positions that are open for your consideration, either as a possible nominee or a recommendation of a woman whose gifts may be just right for the role.

First, each member of the Coordinating Team (CT) attends in person or on Zoom five CT meetings and four Gatherings each year of a three year-term. The CT meetings, in addition of dealing with business, are planning meetings and each member serves on a Gathering Planning Team. The Moderator and Vice Moderators are leaders of the planning teams. Recently all meetings have been on Zoom because of the COVID viruses.

Vice Moderator for Studies and Spiritual Development provides information about the Horizons Bible Study and other resources for devotions and prayer at each of the gatherings and in four newsletters each year.

Communicator promotes Horizons Magazine and other resources available from Presbyterian Women from Louisville at gatherings and in the newsletter. Like to write? All the information is available online.

Resource Liaisons, two are needed. These women are the link for all the PW in churches. One Liaison is presently in the southern part of the Presbytery so it would be great to have someone in the center and in the north. If you enjoy talking with or occasionally visiting women in churches, this is for you.

We need two ***Members of the Search Committee*** to help identify nominees. It may be of interest to know that only the moderator must attend CT meetings although it is always fun to do so. Meetings of the Committee have been held on Zoom and can continue electronically if members wish.

Finally, the ***Registrar*** position involves taking reservations for gatherings, either emailed or mailed paper reservations, and preparing a list of registrants. For Zoom gatherings this list is given to the moderator, for in person gatherings, the registrar works with the treasurer greeting the women as they arrive at a church.



Most of you are aware of three weather-related disasters/emergency situations that occurred since the beginning of December:

Dec 10 – A violent, long-tracked tornado moved across Western Kentucky and several other states during the night leaving 78 persons killed

Dec 30 – Marshall Fire and Middle Fork Fire in Colorado destroyed nearly 1100 homes and structures in the most destructive wildfire in state history

Jan 3 – A major snowstorm produced power outages and left hundreds of drivers stuck for upwards of 24 hours or caused them to crash on roadways around Washington D.C.


