Moderator's Message - Martha Pool

Recently an article crossed my path that made me think of Presbyterian Women. It wasn't a new article. In fact it had been written in 2008. The author is Alexander McCall Smith, author of such books as the No. 1 Ladies' Detective Agency (series) and 44 Scotland Street (series). And the title of the article was "And the Band Played Badly." It tells the story of a group of frustrated people in Scotland who decided that "the pleasure of playing in an orchestra should not be limited to those who were good enough to do so, but should be available to the rankest of amateurs." And so they formed the Really Terrible Orchestra. It is an inclusive orchestra for those who want to play, but can't do so very well and some who can't do so at all. They had a great wave of applications to join. He describes some and their lack of abilities, including his own – one clarinet player could go no higher than middle b-flat; a cellist was very hard of hearing and was also hazy on tuning the strings; sometimes players were discovered to be playing different pieces of music, by different composers, at the same

time. After they "mastered" a few pieces they even held a public concert but did not charge admission, instead opting to provide free glasses of wine beforehand. And that concert was packed. More concerts ensued over the years and they even made a CD of their works even though they have not gotten better at playing. But no matter, they are having fun!



So, you're probably wondering how I relate this to PW. Well, I can

tell you that my experience has been that if you want fun, the place to have it is on our Coordinating Team. And actually, you need very little leadership skill, but a whole lot of willingness to learn, to be successful. If you want to grow spiritually, rubbing shoulders with other women will do that. If you are interested in mission or social justice, the opportunity to be more involved is available. Or if you don't think you have any talents, you're welcome, too! Just by serving you'll gain knowledge and gain a bigger picture of PW. For the most part, we work as a team, plan gatherings as teams and rely on multiple voices and perspectives to accomplish our work. And honestly, we work as efficiently as possible, meeting as infrequently as possible (because everyone is busy), yet listening and learning with each other all along the way. And are we perfect? No way. I've found a lot of encouragement for my own meager attempts and forgiveness offered freely when mistakes are made. If you're a Presbyterian Woman, that is a good enough qualification to obtain a seat at the PW/PSV table. Don't let what you don't know keep you from a chance to grow and have fun while doing it.

WINTER GATHERING RECAP

Seeking Shalom through Justice and Peace was the theme of the 2022 PWPSV Winter Gathering held on February 26, 2022. Rev. Dr. Susan K. Williams Smith discussed her book, With Liberty and Justice for Some: The Bible, the Constitutions and Racism in America. In the book, Smith demonstrates how these texts that we consider sacred have been used to support and sustain white supremacy. After hearing Rev. Smith's remarks, a number of the participants said they planned to read the book which is available from Judson Press https://www.judsonpress.com/Products/J281/with-liberty-and-justice-forsome.aspx?bCategory=JPBKS!JPAAR

In addition to Dr. Smith's talk, the Gathering featured three speakers from PSV churches discussing their justice and peace projects. Jayne Elgin talked about the work of Mifflin Presbyterian Church with two families. Barbara Marshall from Covenant discussed the church's long history working with victims of human trafficking. Finally, Ann B. Marshall described Bethany's Saturday lunch program that has a 16 year history. Two additional books were recommended in one of the small group breakout sessions. They are

- Why Darkness Matters: The Power of Melanin in the Brain, edited by Edward B. Bynum, Richard D. King, T. Owens Moore, and Ann C. Brown. This book explores the connection between melanin (the pigment responsible for skin color) and the brain and the role of melanin in the development of the human body and brain.
- **Rising Out of Hatred: The Awakening of a Former White Nationalist** by Eli Saslow. This book describes how Derek Black, the son of a prominent white nationalist, changed his mind about white supremacy over a period of years.

To help with planning future gatherings, the evaluation asked participants to rate the importance in a number of issues/topics related to justice and peace. The top three selected were domestic violence, immigration, and gun safety. The PW website has resources on all of these topics <u>https://www.presbyterianwomen.org/what_we_do/work-for-justice/</u> and I will write about them in future newsletters.

Finally something not related to the recent gathering is about a book titled **The Whole** Language: The Power of Extravagant Tenderness by Gregory Boyle, founder of Homeboy Industries. In this uplifting book Father Boyle quotes part of a talk by one of the "Homies" (which is how he refers to the former gang members who participate in the programs): "The only other place like Homeboy.....is heaven. I see the flowers bloom there. I arrived as a caterpillar and I wrapped myself in the cocoon of all their services, and now I'm a butterfly" (p. 115). The book is filled with hope; you can read more about Homeboy Industries and Father Boyle at https://homeboyindustries.org

We've done it! We've provided books, games, and Cheryl's Cookies to all 5 of our Presbytery's Juvenile Detention Centers!!! And all the people who received them on behalf of the centers were thrilled!!! Mr. Randle at Franklin County Juvenile Detention Center, the last of the recipients, was overwhelmed with your generosity, saying that they had only 30 well-thumbed books for the roughly 100 young people in

detention. When we delivered about 80 books plus a bunch of comic books (including a boxful of comics they could keep that were donated by the Laughing Ogre), and Steve brought about 50 Bibles, he was ecstatic!!! We also recently heard from Betsy Hauck of the Central Ohio Youth Center in Marysville:

"We can't thank you enough for the kind gifts that the Presbyterian Women in the Presbytery of Scioto Valley provided for our youth this last year. The books and games were such a wonderful stress reliever for our kids and they continue to bring joy to them during their stay with us. I really appreciate how you were still thinking of our kids in the midst of the pandemic. I will add the final Goosebumps book to our kids' library. Kindest regards, Betsy Hauck"

I can hardly imagine what a difference we may have made for the young people in the five centers. God was certainly in our midst when we chose to take on this blessed Mission

Project! And we sent the love of God with our gifts to uplift the young people. May it be so.

And we're still doing it!

The lovely news is we accomplished all this using only a little more than half of the funds we raised. As a result, your Mission Interpretation Committee (MIC)

has spent about half of the remainder for 30 backpacks and 40 Recovery Bibles for the teenage boys who spend 6 months to a year at Perry Multi-County Juvenile Facility (PMCJF). Upon their release, they either return home where there may not be enough to support them, or they have to find their own ways in the world. Thus the importance of these backpacks.

Now here is the challenge! We need to FILL each of those 30 backpacks with the

following items If you or your PW can provide all of the items for one or more backpacks, please let me, Lynn Coons, know by emailing me at lynn.coons@gmail.com or calling me at 614-783-5302. When I have received notification that the contents for 30 backpacks are being provided, I'll let Lynne McLeish know so that she can send out an email to all saying that the backpacks are taken care of. When you bring the "fillings" for the backpacks to the Spring Gathering at Hanover on April 23rd, please bring all the items for each backpack in one large bag so they can more easily be transported to Lancaster where your Mission Interpretation Committee will fill the backpacks and, with Steve Telfer, deliver the backpacks to PMCJF. (see box next page)





Have no fear if you can't help with filling the backpacks though. PMCJF has a gym where the boys play. Many of them come with inadequate footwear or without sneakers appropriate for playing on a gym floor. The boys need gym shoes! As our Moderator, Martha Pool, was leaving PMCJF after having helped deliver the books, games, and cookies back in December, a member of the staff quietly asked her if PW/PSV could possibly help provide those shoes.

Your Mission Interpretation Committee (and your Moderator) would dearly like to fulfill that wish <u>so</u> <u>we are creating a PMCJF Shoe Fund!</u> If you feel similarly and can't help with backpacks, please consider this additional portion of our Mission Project. As we did last fall for the books and games, please make checks out to PW/PSV and mark the memo line "Mission Project." Psalm 29:3 The voice of the Lord is upon the water. The God of Glory thundereth. The Lord is upon many waters.

One of my favorite things to do when I travel to Jamaica is to look at/stare at the Caribbean Sea. It's clear, blue-green in color. Sometimes when the surf is rough, there are white caps on each wave. Sometimes it's just lapping at the sand under your feet. I love the water. Maybe it's because my horoscope is a water sign-Pisces: the fishes. Maybe it's because I live in land-locked Ohio. Maybe it's because, like David writes in Psalm 29:3, "The voice of the Lord is upon the waters." I wish all people could experience the seas or oceans at least once. This is where they can witness and feel "the God of Glory thundereth."

In the concordance of my Bible, there are 3 books that reference "rivers," 16 books that reference "water," and 10 books that reference "water<u>s</u>." Isaiah 48:18 tells us "(and) thy righteousness (is) as the waves of the sea." The Bible is full of stories that take place in water, on water, with water, near water, flood water, no water, under water-"the Lord is upon many waters." The power of the seas is a perfect example of the power of our savior.

During this visit, I went parasailing. I developed a whole new perspective of the Caribbean Sea. I've seen the sea from the airplane, from the beach and now from a "seat" with buckles, cables, hooks and straps! Once you are strapped into the harness, the boat speeds up and then up you go, above the water. You're now a human kite! That clear, blue-green water is beneath you until the boat slows down and as you come down, your feet dip into the water. Then the boat speeds up and the chute (that looks like Spiderman) fills with wind and up you go again. Once up in the air it is soooooooo quiet. It was during this quiet time that I felt the love of God upon the water.

Father, thank you for your perfect love. Help me to praise you for it and share it with others. Amen.

Hanover is approximately 7 miles east of Newark, Ohio. Take OH-16 east from Newark and go past "the Big Basket" and Wilson's Garden Center. You will see the big, green and white sign directing you to turn left at the traffic light for Hanover and Licking Valley Schools. In a short distance (.1 mile), turn right onto Licking Valley Road and almost immediately you will cross railroad tracks. Continue for about 2 miles to the village of Hanover. At the traffic light turn left onto Main Street (Hickman Rd.) In a short distance, the church is on the right at 732 N. Main St.

Dear PW sisters,

You will notice that the registration fee has increased to \$15 in an effort to not only create funds for the PW/PSV but also to allow for the increased cost to provide lunch. For 2 years now, by using Zoom, the CT has worked to continue

providing Gatherings. Have you thought about how those Gatherings were funded? There were no registration fees received for these, but there were still costs such as honorariums provided to speakers (often we had 2 or 3 per Gathering), individuals providing technical capabilities, workshop leaders, and the cost of the Zoom license itself. If you should find yourself feeling extra generous () and willing to bolster the treasury, please feel free to do so by registering with a \$20 bill at Hanover and telling the registrar to "keep the change for the PWPSV".
