Dear Friends,

As I was thinking about this January newsletter article, the first one of the New Year of 2022, I thought back to the article from November of last year. In that article, I asked the question, what difference does being a Christian make for Thanksgiving? All kinds of people celebrate Thanksgiving, believers or non-believers, but what's different about being a Christian?

The same question could be asked about the New Year's celebration. Both Thanksgiving and New Year's holidays are largely secular. Even though Thanksgiving has religious roots, it was made a national holiday by Abraham Lincoln in 1863, and it's celebrated as a national holiday rather than a church holiday.

With New Year's, we simply mark the occasion of one year clicking off into a new one. You often see cartoons around this time of the New Year's baby being passed by an older man, sometimes shown as Father Time. The baby is often greeted with a worn-out look and some kind of comment like, "Good luck, kid. You're going to need it," a wearied response that seems appropriate following the year 2021.

As I think about this from a religious perspective, I note the hopefulness that comes from a new calendar year. As with anything new, we hope for something better than what came before. We hope that, however bad things were before, at least it can't get any worse. Yet the Calvinist in me wants to say, it can always get worse.

Another big part of New Years that you often hear about is the New Year's resolution, where people resolve to do better in some part of their life, such as exercise, saving money, or losing weight. We rile up our courage and resolve and tell ourselves, this year, I'm really going to do better. It kind of reminds me of Charlie Brown saying, "This year, I'm really going to kick that football."

Again, the Calvinist in me says that most of these efforts are doomed to failure, and from a Reformed perspective, it's usually somehow because of human sin. No matter how hard we seem to try, we just can't seem to will ourselves to do better, just on our own effort or on our own steam.

The big difference that Christians might take with this approach is by saying that human beings are always going to be broken, and our big efforts to make things better on our own are usually going to fall apart, whether with individual New Year's resolutions, or with attempts to make the world a better place, however noble or sincere.


However, we do not despair or becoming cynical, because whereas we fail, Christ can make things better by redeeming our brokenness. As I mentioned in November, Christian thanksgiving is not based on things always going well in our lives, but it is based on God being with us, even when things don't go well. Especially when things don't go well.

What Christ can do is help us get through all the tough ups and downs that we will inevitably go through, this coming year, and every year. That is my prayer for myself and my family and for all of us, that in the coming year, we will stay close to Christ, who can redeem our time, no matter what happens.


