

## A NOTE FROM HANNAH:

Dear First Pres,

How are you? Really, how are you? From my conversations with you, most of you seem well. A little tired, a little frustrated with pandemic restrictions, but mostly safe, mostly happy, and mostly secure. Some of you are grieving. You have family or friends who have lost a battle with COVID or cancer or mental health. Some of you are struggling with new diagnoses and ongoing medical concerns, unmanageable physical pain, the exhaustion of trying to find new hope every single day--or maybe just the exhaustion of trying to figure out what's for dinner every single day. I feel your joy, your hope, your pain, and your exhaustion with you, and I'm honored in your trust to share it with me.

One of the spiritual practices I've tried to cultivate over the past several months is a practice of gratitude. Throughout the good, the bad, and the ugly, I have found gratitude to be a grounding, joyful, and breath-giving practice. So this month, here is what I'm most grateful for in my work with this church:

**1) Zoom Bible Stories and Coloring with our Pre-K Students:** Y'all, this is the most joyful, carefree fifteen minutes of my week. These children are bright, they are kind, they are creative and curious and full of questions. We've spent the past several weeks talking about different parts of the Creation Story, and they have an ability to marvel at God's creation with the great gift of childlike wonder. In my time with them, they have helped me to find that same wonder in myself once more.

**2)** Zoom Enneagram Class: Every Monday evening, I have had the immense privilege to gather with 12+ wonderful women of this church to explore the Enneagram, a personality system, as a tool for Spiritual growth. Together we have bonded over vulnerable moments, grown in our own self-discovery, and strengthened relationships with our family members, co-workers, and friends. This small group has been a source of life, joy, and exploration for me. I'm grateful for the wonderful women who decided to sign up and give it a shot with me!

**3)** Connecting with Community Partners: You know what's fun? Starting as your Community Pastor in the middle of a pandemic! Nevertheless, I have spent this month having distanced and outdoor meetings with the directors of various community initiatives around town. I am forming friendships with these people as I learn more and more about the services they offer, the change they inspire, and their ultimate vision for Rocky Mount. Let me assure you of what you already know, God's Kingdom is being built in this little corner of Eastern North Carolina and spreading far and wide. I'm honored to be a part of it with you.

What have you been grateful for this month?


## HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE OCTOBER SESSION MEETING

to this winter and feel like you are sitting in the middle of the sanctuary. We'll have details soon for how you can get a copy for family and friends.




## Handcraft Ministry

## PW THANK OFFERING

The Presbyterian Women's Thank Offering was started in 1888. Concerned people have responded and given sacrificially "a thank offering to the Lord". More than \$26 million has been granted to 1,700 different projects worldwide through the Thank Offering.

The Creative Ministries Offering Committee of PW received 49 applications for this year's grants. 15 were funded, 13 serve people in the U.S. and 2 are international. Two of the 15 are in our Synod of the Mid-Atlantic (Presbytery of Western Carolina & National Capital Presbytery). Western Carolina's project is Faith 4 Justice—a bridge between local faith leaders and Black community leaders. National Capital's project is Crossroads Food Community Network.

We can express our deep gratitude for God's blessings in our lives by giving back to people in our communities and around the world. Through the Thank Offering, we help fund programs that provide education relief from disaster, safe housing and so much more. Let us give thanks to God for one another as this year is not like any we have seen before. Thank you for your prayers, your love and support of Presbyterian Women. We hope you are able to give generously as we collect the Thank Offering during worship on **November 22, 2020** or send in a check made payable to Presbyterian Women (memo line: Thank Offering).


