I did not know 4 years ago I would be asked to come and serve as your bridge interim pastor. From a theological view I believed God was calling me (through the leaders of the church) to come and serve. From an emotional point I could not imagine the nurturing journey it has been. From a selfish point I discovered a loving and supportive community which I missed after retiring from my last pastorate.

From a physical point the last 12 months have been a challenge. A challenge which became easier because of the nurturing support I received from my family, your prayers, cards, phone calls, words and kind thoughts. While there have been many up's and down's within this journey, I am now nearing major transitions. The first transition will be a scheduled kidney transplant on March 8, 2021 at the Virginia Commonwealth University Hospital in Richmond, VA.

I want to shout from the house top how blessed I am to have such a loving family. Every member of my immediate family and several others, quickly responded by saying "I will give you a kidney." The best match turned out to be our daughter, Amy. Her gift is nothing short of a miracle for me. Judy stepped up as a caregiver that exceeded my expectation. I didn't think I could love my family more but I was wrong.

The second transition, which parallels the transplant, is my retirement from serving this faith family. The opportunity to walk with you during your life challenges and transition has blessed me more than you can imagine. As with my own family, I do not possess the vocabulary to express my depth of gratitude to you. Thank you for this experience just doesn't seem adequate but, "Thank you with my love!"

Going forward, we plan to remain active worshippers with FPCRM. My short term goal is to regain my physical health. We still have things we want to do and unknown places to go. Yes, we hope to become active bike riders again.

My long term goal is to be open to what presents itself before me. I have no plans to serve another church however, I didn't have plans to serve FPCRM either.

Once again, thank you for letting me journey with you and for being a participant in your own travels. Peace and blessings be with each of you! You will forever hold a special place in our heart.

#### A NOTE FROM OUR COMMUNITY PASTOR ....

I was feeling down the other day because of all the rain and the whole "dark by 5pm" thing. I don't think I'm alone in that. "Just 28 days until the time change," a friend told me, and it felt as though that were the best news I'd ever heard! Now, normally, in normal years, I'm not really someone who tracks when the time changes. If I'm honest, it kind of sneaks up on me each season, and I'm reminded at the last minute by some gimmicky post on Facebook to get up at the right time for church the next day. But this year, the news of the time change—28 days away— was life-giving. It turned my day around, reframed my outlook, and gave me hope. The promise of the time change was the light at the end of the tunnel. And now, at the start of March, longer days are just 14 days away—March  $14^{th}$ . One year after everything changed.

March 15, 2020 was the first Sunday my church in Atlanta stopped worshipping in person. It was the day before all my seminary classes went online. It was the first day things started to shift, the beginning of life being done completely differently. The beginning of living in constant levels of national anxiety and personal uncertainty. Yuck. It has been (almost) one year of Covid life, and after talking to many of you, I know I have not been alone in feeling the suffocation of these winter months a little harder than usual.

But, on March 14, 2021 the sun is coming up and it's going to light the world longer into the night. It is as if the earth itself is saying that despair is only for a season. With two more minutes of sunlight each day, the earth is crying out the truth of the gospel that we can't, one year in: "THE LIGHT SHINES IN THE DARKNESS AND THE DARKNESS DOES NOT OVERCOME IT."

My friends, our world will not be back to the way we once knew it by March 14. But the sun will shine longer and longer that day, a promise from God's creation and God God's-self that things will get better—are getting better. Even when the darkness around us is deep, God's presence and warmth persevere, pulling us into better days.

Hang in there, Church. We will grieve when we need to grieve, and we will celebrate when we need to celebrate, but my promise is God's promise: we are going to be okay.

**Lent** is traditionally a time of solemn reflection and repentance, but there is enough solemnity in our lives already. Rather, we will use this season to think about growth and gardening, tilling and reaping. What do we want to cultivate, and what do we need to let go of in order to live

most fully into our calls as individuals and as a church? We will use this time to reflect on who we are as a congregation, where we are going, and how we might trust the Holy Spirit along the way. We hope these offerings—ranging from an at-home devotional to hybrid education opportunities to engaging worship will enrich your spiritual journey and our growth as a

This Lenten season, we are going to create a congregational art project—a tree in particular— that will continue to grow and take shape throughout our Lenten worship

Lesson 4: Integrating Our Space (P. 71-92)








Help Wanted! Our Flower







#### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION UPDATE

#### Pre-K Kids

Pastors Matt and Hannah are leading a Bible Stories and Coloring Zoom session for our littlest members on Wednesdays at 10:00 a.m. The Pre-K families will receive their own link for this and do not need to pre-register like the Adult Zoom classes.

#### Elementary Age Kids

We have selected a new curriculum called "Celebrate Wonder" and each family received a notebook with a weekly lesson and a family activity book. A short video is available for the families to access and watch on their own schedule.

#### Middle School
