#### A NOTE FROM OUR COMMUNITY PASTOR



When I worked as a college chaplain, my students came to me one day and said "we want to organize a Smile Campaign for all the helpers on campus." "Great, I'm in" I said—"What's a Smile Campaign, and who are the helpers you have in mind?" Turns out, a Smile Campaign was really Appreciation Drive and the helpers—well, they were the cafeteria workers and the grounds guys, campus security and the student health practitioners, our custodial staff and our library technicians. The helpers were the people in the background that didn't get the Thank You Notes or the publicity but whose service and personalities were crucial to the workings of the campus. The students contacted the list of each department, got the names of every individual, spent hours one weekend making cookies and writing hand written notes, and on that Monday, they organized a group of peers to trounce around campus in the rain delivering cookies and notes to all the unsung heroes who worked tirelessly in the background, making campus the safest, healthiest, and most beautiful it could be. My former students saw the act of appreciation to be a priority in how they spent their time and how they interacted with people around them. I learned a lot from them.

Appreciation is a life-skill, a practice, and a commitment. Appreciation is a spiritual discipline, modeled by God when God fashioned the sea and the sky and vegetation on land, the birds of the air and the fish of the sea, land mammals and humans—God created, God appreciated, and God rested. Over and over again, God repeated "And it was good."

As such, appreciation is gratitude out loud. If gratitude is a feeling within us that wells up and makes us feel warm, appreciation is the action that is prompted from it. Appreciation names the good out loud; it acknowledges the other person's humanity; it proclaims to an individual that you see their worth, and that their existence matters to you. Appreciation says "I see you. I love you. Thank you—you make a difference in my life."

Moreover, appreciation is a gift simultaneously given and received. While it is a gift we give to others, appreciating others is also a gift we give ourselves. It retrains our eyes to focus on the positive, to practice grace, and to live with hearts wide open. When so much around us tells us to turn inward, to protect what is ours, to be leery and wary, practicing appreciation helps us to open ourselves up to our community and to relationship—appreciation helps us to live the way Jesus lived.

So as you read this little note and ponder gratitude, appreciation, and the like, who are the people in your day-to-day life who make a difference to you? Who are the people in the back ground that make your day-to-day life possible (i.e. grocery stockers, waiters and waitresses, custodial staff, housekeepers)? And how do you let these people know that they matter to you?

Because, after all, appreciation is the language of love. And love is our call.

Know that you are eternally loved. Your service to this church is appreciated. And you matter—not because of what you do, but because of who you are.

#### PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN




Donations are also accepted to the flower fund so the church can provide flowers on dates that are not assigned.
