

# A NOTE FROM OUR COMMUNITY PASTOR

One chilly November morning during seminary, I decided to run a 5K. Not just any 5K, mind you, but a **Tough Mudder**—the kind of 5K where you **army crawl** through mud and **tight rope** over water and **catapult** your body over massive obstacles, one after another, for three miles—for fun, supposedly.

Before the run began, all the participants gathered at the starting line, ready to charge forward, to get one foot ahead. I was at the front, preparing to break into a full sprint—which, mind you, is not the best way to start a long race. **Before the whistle blew, though**, the organizer threw us for a loop and asked us all to take a knee. We did. Repeat after me, he said:

"My teammates are more important than my finishing time." We repeated. "Everyone out here is my teammate." We repeated. "I will not leave my teammates behind." We repeated.

We repeated his statements one by one, committing our time and assistance to each and every person running the race with us, pledging to encourage and support each step of the way, and, in a moment, the entire tone of the race changed. As I ran through obstacles on that North Georgia farm, fully relying on the support of others and offering my own when I was able, I realized what a countercultural event I was participating in. The Tough Mudder was no "every man for himself" event. It wasn't about winning or getting ahead or being the fastest or the best. This was no competition, it was a collaboration. It felt...hopeful, grace-filled, celebratory.

The season of Advent is upon us, which is itself a reminder of hope. Hope is not some fickle feeling that changes with the weather or is dependent on a good news cycle or external validation from peers and colleagues. Rather hope is a decision and a commitment—one marked by persistence toward a renewed and reconciled world. A journey walked in hope is based on relationship and it is founded in peace, one where swords are turned into plowshares and nations rise up, not against one another but toward the house of the Lord, walking with the intentionality of God's hope toward a new world. In a culture that feeds on adversarial opposition and zero-sum winners, a commitment toward hope turns us around, changes the game, and puts us on a different path.

When I stepped foot on that farm in North Georgia that November day, I was prepared for a competition and I was ready to win. But when the whistle blew, every single competitor made the decision to beat their metaphorical swords into plowshares and took off the armor of independence for the cloak of community. I think this is where hope lies--at the heart of teamwork, relationship, encouragement and affirmation.

As we journey through advent together, reminding ourselves why Christ came into this world at all, may we renew our journey of hope and recommit to walking it together.

- Loose checks in the Sunday collection or checks placed in Jeanne Shannon's mailbox All checks will be applied to your pledge unless indicated otherwise in the 'memo' line.
- Bank draft This is a safe and steady way to consistently support First Presbyterian Church. It can be selected on your pledge card and attaching a voided check. The monthly bank draft occurs on the 25<sup>th</sup> of each month. If the 25<sup>th</sup> falls on a weekend or holiday, it is drafted on the next business day. If you currently have a bank draft and want to continue, this can be indicated on your pledge card. The draft for your 2022 contribution would begin January 25<sup>th</sup> 2022. If you choose the bank draft, you can also stop it by contacting Jeanne Shannon in the church office 2 weeks before the 25<sup>th</sup> of that month.
- Envelopes these can be ordered by marking this option on your pledge card
- Sale of stock Our Schwab online does not include the church member name in the trade details. If using this method, please contact Jeanne Shannon with the details or ask your broker contact Jeanne in the church office. The stock sale process takes two weeks from initial trade date to receiving the check so it should begin in November to allow time to make the 12/31 deadline due to holidays.
- Online giving Sow the seeds for the future with online giving today! This is an easy and convenient way to give your tithes using a debit or credit card or electronic funds transfer. The service through PayPal is easily accessed through the church website. You can rest easy knowing that the transaction is safe and secure, and your gift will be available to our ministry immediately, with no waiting periods. # **WORSHIP UPDATE**

Effective on November 17, 2021 by the guidance of the Session, masks are no longer required for vaccinated individuals when in the church building or during worship. The Session continues to encourage those who are unvaccinated or who simply feel more comfortable in a mask to continue to wear one. The Session will review its masking policy based on the metrics provided by the Nash County Health Department and the policy will be reviewed if the number of new positive cases exceeds 200 or the hospitalizations at Nash UNC exceed 20.
