LIFE TOGETHER: A LENTEN CONVERSATION THURSDAY, MARCH 14

At our January 26 meeting, we began a series of conversations around the theme of our "life together" in the Church, including local congregations, Transylvania Presbytery, the Presbyterian Church (USA), and the global ecumenical Church. Some notes from our January 26 conversation are attached.

For this evening's gathering, we will focus our conversation around the shared experience of the spiritual life, particularly during the season of Lent. Regarding the spiritual life, consider the following reflection from Evelyn Underhill:

My spiritual life is not something specialized and intense; a fenced off devotional patch rather difficult to cultivate, and needing to be sheltered from the cold winds of the outer world. Nor is it an alternative to my outward, practical life. On the contrary, it is the very source of that quality and purpose which makes my practical life worthwhile...Still less does the spiritual life mean a mere cultivation of one's own soul; poking about our interior premises with an electric torch. Even though in its earlier stages it may, and generally does, involve dealing with ourselves, and that in a rather drastic way, and therefore requires personal effort and personal choice, it is also intensely social; for it is a life that is shared with all other spirits, whether in the body or out of the body, to adopt St. Paul's words. You remember how Dante says that directly a soul ceases to say mine and says ours...Here all interpenetrate, and all, however humble and obscure their lives may seem, can and do affect each other. Every advance made by one is made for all...

(as found in The Westminster Collection of Christian Meditations)

With the personal, yet shared, nature of the spiritual life in mind, reflect upon the following and come prepared to continue the conversation:

Lent is a time to take the time to...

...let the power of our faith story take hold of us,

...intensify our living into Christ,

...experience a fresh, new taste of God.

How might these serve as invitation/description of the lenten spiritual journey, individually and together?

LIFE TOGETHER: A GENERATIVE CONVERSATION NOTES FROM JANUARY 26, 2019

At our January 26 meeting, we began a conversation around our "life together" in the Church (local congregations, Transylvania Presbytery, PCUSA). Below are a few samples of the "group notes"* from that conversation.

Regarding question (1) - What do you imagine Jesus had in mind when he thought about his disciples' (then and now) life together? What scriptures come to your mind that provide insight into his imagination?

The disciples and Jesus traveled together. When we travel together we have to get to know each other intimately, and we have to live with humor because we need humor to survive living so intimately...Jesus desired us to take care of one another...Jesus desired us to be kind to one another, and strangers, to surprise each other with kindness...Jesus desired that we connect with one another, including those who are going through similar life circumstances, and those who are of other generations.

Regarding question #2 - Recall occasions in your own experience when you caught a glimpse of Jesus' imagination.

Working in the community with a congregation(s) of another tradition... A church session "stepping up" in leadership in the absence of a pastor... A ministers meeting just to "hang out"... Christian camps... the PCUSA pension system... At retreats when we take time in solitude and together. Friendships require time... Trying to imagine ways to answer unanswerable questions... One night in a hospital ER when several gunshot victims - rivals - were brought in and the families of those "rival" victims came together holding hands and praying, while a homeless stranger heard the sirens and came into the waiting room to pray for them all.

Regarding question #3 - What might be the possibilities of, and barriers to, sharing life together in the Presbyterian Church (USA), Transylvania Presbytery, and/or your particular congregation?

Barriers: Denominational and secular politics...interpretation and understanding of scripture...geographic divides and distances...gender and age inequality in leadership...Presbytery "mono-culture"...our own selves.

Possibilities: Conversation will help you understand, more important than changing views...We need to get over our fears...Sharing resources between flourishing and struggling congregations...More action, less words...Meeting and involving a variety of people...Mission unites us more than anything (e.g. ecumenical mission, local ministerial associations)

Coordinating Commission Report to Presbytery March 14, 2019

Minutes, Coordinating Commission Presbytery of Transylvania February 8, 2019

The Coordinating Commission of the Presbytery of Transylvania met at 10:05 AM at the Salem Presbyterian Church, Winchester, KY. The meeting was a combined meeting of the Coordinating Commission and chairs of presbytery commissions and ministries. Coordinating Commission members present: Mike Ward, Linda Crawford, Nell Line, Katie Busroe, and Mary Reed. Commission members excused: Tom Burns, David Hoskins, Linda Maconochie, and John White. Chairs of commissions/ministries present: Connie Turner, Jay Mumper, Janet Prewitt, Lisa Eye, Kathy Riley, Matt Falco, David Crawford, Melissa Bane-Sevier, and Ryan Shrauner. Chairs excused: Anne Chesnut and Beth Garrod-Logsdon. Presbytery staff present included Robyn Justus, Robby Lear, Philip Lotspeich, and Jerry Utt. Philip called the meeting to order and provided an overview of the day's schedule. Philip led a devotional on Acts 2 and divided the group into smaller groups for individual prayers and sharing of lives.

Philip began discussions by introducing the leaders of the presbytery and reviewing the goals of the Long-Range Plan. Target areas include: neighborhoods, technology centers, strengthening small congregations, effective presbytery meetings, Burnamwood, Staffing, and Communications. Philip outlined the current presbytery structure. Commissions: Pastoral Transitions, Congregational Issues, Church Closings and Dismissals, Administration, Preparation for Ministry, Representation, Burnamwood, and Coordinating. Ministries: Mission, Leadership Development, Church Revitalization and Redevelopment, Christian Formation, and Presbyterian Women.

Philip asked the question: What are we missing? Open discussion and comments listed:

Need for training: chairs, new members, education and nurture

Clearer responsibilities and expectations

Include former chairs to help?

Whom to contact when have questions or need help

Yearly planning meetings important

Intentional gatherings to talk about coordination, areas of overlap

Less independent groups and more working together

Can entire commissions/ministries meet together for leadership or training?

Not much intentionality on worship life of local congregations and presbytery as whole

Can we add a worship ministry team?

Can this worship team help congregations and lead presbytery events?

Can we use teams of people to plan presbytery worship?

Workshop or presbytery day: share resources, ideas, conferences

Can we encourage participation at Montreat and other events?

Can we share a presbytery-wide common liturgy or Lenten study?

Can we introduce pastors and worship leaders to the new Book of Common Worship?

Can we include more leaders? Different leaders? (Music directors, youth, young adults)

How can we think about technology (worship, church life)?

Acknowledging different comfort and skill levels with technology

What experts do we have and what can they teach us?

Weekly E-News: articles on open spaces, best practices in worship and welcome, what works? How do we move forward? What's the "different" that we need to be doing?

Philip asked another question. What should be eliminated from our structure? Comments listed:

Learning to trust and learning to take control of their lives is a lesson that is difficult to learn. Each girl comes with her unique story. The needs of each girl are addressed and tended to.



Eileen Levy, Executive Director of The Well of Lexington, Inc, has spent the last 10 years within the nonprofit world. She has a background in communications and marketing, which she uses with community outreach groups, such as Colors of Promise and Lazos que Unen. She earned her B.A. in Communications Studies from Eastern Kentucky University and is a certified patient navigator. Her passion for helping others has led her to become a member of Altrusa of Lexington which in turn helps her to empower survivors of all kinds.



Seth Frazier, a detective with the Lexington Police Department, will share what human trafficking looks like in Kentucky.



Summer Dickerson is a survivor of human trafficking and domestic violence. She is the founder and Executive Director of Women of the Well Ministry in Louisville, Kentucky. Summer travels around Kentucky and to other states talking to professionals and other survivors about her journey to free herself from "the life" and from addiction. In addition, Summer is also a member of the Attorney General's Survivor Council in Frankfort and is on the National Survivor Leader Board. Summer will soon be traveling to New York City to present her story about overcoming human trafficking to the United Nations.

Report to Presbytery Treasurer's Report/Administration Commission/Trustees March 14, 2019

Recommendation to Presbytery:

Recommend to Presbytery that Sara Benedetti, Teaching Elder, be nominated as Presbytery Treasurer for a three-year term to the class of 2021.

Information to Presbytery:

• The Treasurer's Report as of December 31, 2018 is attached.

Notes from Treasurer's Report

Operating Budget

- 1. Total Revenue as of 12/31/18 is \$387,469 as compared to \$391,963 at 12/31/17. This is a decrease in revenue of \$4,494.
- 2. Total Expense as of 12/31/18 is \$405,469 as compared to \$437,140 at 12/31/17. This is a decrease in expense of \$31,671.
- 3. Total Net for the operating budget as of 12/31/18 is (\$18,000) as compared to (\$45,177) at 12/31/17.
- 4. General Reserves of \$18,000 were used to balance the shortfall.

Burnamwood Budget

- 1. Total Burnamwood revenue as of 12/31/18 is \$203,584 as compared to \$197,420 at 12/31/17. This is an increase in revenue of \$6,164.
- 2. Total Burnamwood expense as of 12/31/18 is \$241,592 as compared to \$210,289 at 12/31/17. This is an increase in expense of \$31,303.
- 3. Total Net for Burnamwood as of 12/31/18 is (\$38,008) as compared to (\$12,870) at 12/31/17.
- 4. Unified dollars of \$70,000 were budgeted and used for the Burnamwood budget in 2018. An additional \$38,008 was used from General Reserves to balance the shortfall.

Unified Giving and Per Capita Spreadsheet

A per capita and unified giving spreadsheet by church as requested by Presbytery is attached.

Actions Taken by Administration Commission since November presbytery meeting:

- 1. Annual financial reports as of December 31, 2018 were reviewed and approved including reserves, foundation accounts, unified mission and per capita contributions.
- 2. Approved a request from the Lexington Korean Church to lease their building at 333 Redding Road, Lexington to 333 Church of Lexington, Kentucky for \$3,000 a month.
- 3. Approved a transfer of \$25,000 from the General Fund at the Foundation to the Chase Operating Account for cash flow purposes.
- 4. Approved Sara Benedetti as an authorized signer on the Presbytery's banking and foundation accounts.
- 5. Year-to-date financial reports as of January 31, 2019 were review and approved including reserves, foundation accounts, unified mission and per capita contributions.

- 6. Approved a request from the Corbin Presbyterian Church to lease and an option to purchase the commercial building, located at 515 Master Street, Corbin Kentucky, that was donated to the church in 2016.
- 7. Approved a request from the Korean Presbyterian Church to sell the property located at 333 Redding Road, Lexington, Kentucky for \$475,000.
- 8. Approved a transfer of \$6,000 from the Nicholasville Redevelopment Fund at the Foundation to the Chase Operating Account to fund the initial development of the Phila Consulting project approved at the November presbytery meeting.
- 9. Received and reviewed a Burnamwood Redevelopment Plan from the Burnamwood Commission. Concurred with the Burnamwood recommendation to Presbytery that 90 acres of Camp Burnamwood be selectively logged with the guidance of a Forest Management Plan designed by the Division of Forestry/Natural Resources Conservation Services. The proceeds of the logging operation will be split in the following manner: 33% will go to the operating budget of the camp. 66% will be designated for capital improvements to the camp.

Burnamwood Commission Report

Last Meeting - February 21st, 2019, 6:00pm - Maxwell Street Presbyterian Church

The Commission met and reviewed programming. Applications for summer staff are being received and interviews will be held in the coming weeks.

The Commission reviewed a proposal to add a new Day Camp program designed to provide ministry to Estill County and area children and youth. This will be a program that runs parallel with the existing summer camps, designed for specific age groups and for those with special interests. Campers will be dropped off and picked up the same day. Fees for the camp will be on a sliding scale.

The BAM program has two large and one smaller group signed up for the 2019 season.

A new weekly Volunteer program to help provide maintenance and improvements to the camp was approved and scheduled to start immediately. Volunteers will be painting and making improvements to the camp.

The Burnamwood Bowl-a-Thon is scheduled for Sunday, February 24th. Update since the meeting: The Bowl-a-Thon raise approximately \$2,500.

A Burnamwood Redevelopment Plan is under review and open for comments. This will be presented to the presbytery for review and input at an upcoming meeting. Matt and Robby met with the Coordinating Committee to review the Logging proposal, and are scheduled to meet with the Administrative Committee later in February for the same purpose.

Motion: The Commission moves that 90 acres of Camp Burnamwood be selectively logged with the guidance of a Forest Management Plan designed by the Division of Forestry/Natural Resources Conservation Services. The proceeds of the logging operation will be split in the following manner: 33% will go to the operating budget of the camp. 66% will be designated for capital improvements to the camp. All efforts will be made to limit the impact to the aesthetics/natural resources of the camp and to meet the goals of creating a viable ministry at the camp.

Burnamwood Camp and Conference Center Logging Proposal - Q&As

- How did this proposal come about?

In 2018, the Commission was informed by the Coordinating Commission that the current level of presbytery support was unsustainable. As the Commission researched how Burnamwood's ministry might become more sustainable, it became clear that our facilities are either inadequate or have fallen into such a state of disrepair that significant investment in the camp's infrastructure is required.

- What other ways might the camp raise capital for these expenses?

In addition to selective logging, there are two other options that the Commission continues to investigate. A capital campaign might help address these needs, but would impact the financial resources of congregations, many of whom are already feeling stretched. Another option would be to sell a portion of the camp to an organization, such as Kentucky Nature Preserves, under whom an arrangement could be made that would allow access to the land by the camp, but prevent future development or the harvesting of timber.

- How has the Commission researched this?

The Commission engaged the services of a certified forester, Dick Brantigan, to develop a preliminary logging plan. Mr. Brantigan comes not only with 35 years worth of experience in the forestry industry, but also with positive recommendations from and experience working with other local church camps to this project. The Commission is also working the Kentucky Division of Forestry office in Morehead and the Natural Resources Conservation Services office in Richmond on developing a Forest Management Plan for the property.

- How much of the camp will be selectively logged?

The proposal is to selectively log 90 of the camp's 480+ acres, in an area located on the north side of the lake, mostly out of sight of the main areas of camp. Although this is a more expensive method, specific trees will be marked for harvesting before logging the area based on best timber stand management practices. Because of the existing soil structure, the Commission is also investigating best soil management practices and requiring a particular method of harvesting, such as horse logging, which may have less of an impact on the natural habitat.

- How much capital might this raise?

The revenue from is dependent on many factors such as how much it will cost to construct an access road to the timber, how much logging companies will bid to log the site, and how much it will cost to make to timber stand improvements after logging that may allow for future logging. Also complicating the calculation is the possibility that grants might be utilized to offset the cost of the timber stand improvements. Although the number could be much higher, even by as much as 50% more, given what we've learned, the Commission is conservatively estimating that the camp will receive \$75,000. The Commission is also investigating whether or not some of the timber could be processed on site and used for the construction of new facilities.

- How will the funds be used?

Capital improvement projects to enhance the infrastructure, hospitality, and ministry of the Camp. The Commission believes that investing in making our facilities more accessible, paving the road to the BAM House, conditioning the spaces (such as the Dining Hall) for year-round use, and having new program resources is vitally important, not only because it will encourage multigenerational ministry within the presbytery, but also the local community and surrounding counties.

- What about using the funds to offset Burnamwood's operating expenses?

The Commission met with the Administrative Commission and proposed that 1/3rd of the proceeds from the timber sale be used to offset operating expenses and 2/3rds be used for capital improvements.

- When will the logging happen?

Logging will be scheduled after the main summer camping season, lessening the impact on camp users. The process will take 2-3 months depending on weather conditions.

What about planting new trees or future logging?

Part of the Forest Management Plan will address this. After logging, the soils will be stabilized, and new trees will be planted. It is likely that the Natural Resources Conservation Service in coordination with the University of Kentucky will develop this plan. It is possible that the presbytery and congregation members, if interested, could play a role in helping plant trees.
