"O that you would tear open the heavens and come down" - Isaiah 64:1 This verse from the prophet Isaiah perfectly sums up the plea of the season of Advent, which begins this Sunday. If we're honest, it sums up our pleas for most of 2020 too, hasn't it? This year we'll join with our siblings in Christ of the Northwestern Minnesota Synod under the Advent theme "Lord, Stir Us to Dream." The first part of dreaming is lamenting and naming the things that are not as they should be. This is actually what the prophet Isaiah does time and again. We think of prophets as people who see the future. But prophets are actually those who see the present most clearly. What are the things in our world that you wish could change? A cure for COVID? An end to division and divisiveness? No oppression or injustice? No hunger or inequality? No racism or sexism? I'm sure there are plenty more, right? When we partner with God in dreaming of a world where peace and justice reign, it often leads us to cry out, "O that you would tear open the heavens and come down!' The first part of this Advent journey always begins with naming the things that are not as they should be - lamenting where we are and what we struggle with. We acknowledge the brokenness that we sit in and may feel closing in on us. Name these things in prayer. It doesn't have to be anything elaborate. "Hey God. Here's what stinks today: [insert list here]." We can change what we can't name. So put it into words. Once we've had a chance to lament where we are, we'll embark on the next step over the next three weeks that will lead us into dreaming and committing to our future together. God hears our cries. God hears our prayers and our frustrations. God is with us as we wait for the coming of Christ. As we light candles and wait for God to tear open the heavens, may you be blessed to remember that our laments are not signs of unfaithfulness, but rather are part and parcel of a deep faith and connection to God. Together we wait. We hope. We lament. Grace + Peace to you this Advent season, Pastor Eric
