Take "Come Thou Long Expected Jesus".

Come, thou long expected Jesus, born to set thy people free; from our fears and sins release us; let us find our rest in thee. Israel's strength and consolation, hope of all the earth thou art, dear desire of ev'ry nation, joy of ev'ry longing heart.

What a powerful prayer in this season of Advent.

Perhaps my favorite verse of any Advent hymn comes from a hymn called "Each Winter as the Year Grows Older."

Yet I believe beyond believing that life can spring from death; that faith can flower from our grieving, that we can catch our breath and turn transfixed by faith.

And consider the promise of perhaps the most well-known and loved Advent hymn: "O Come, O Come Emmanuel". The refrain carries such a powerful promise for us today.

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.

So in this season of Advent, Beloved family of God, whatever griefs you are feeling, whatever burdens you are carrying today, may your heart feel a bit of relief at this promise: receive what joy there is to be found in this season. Because God, indeed, *shall* come to God's people.

And for that, we rejoice.
