I was making breakfast the other morning and I had the griddle plugged in and the hand mixer turned on. We were listening to music and Milo was watching PBS Kids.

All of a sudden everything shut off.

After reassuring everyone that everything was okay, I went downstairs to check the fuse box and, sure enough, we'd blown a fuse.

Pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber wrote something really powerful last week that I've been reflecting on that sometimes our brains and our emotional systems are like a fuse box.

If we get too overwhelmed with things happening, too much stress at school or home or work, our bodies have a way of telling us that. And parts of our body can shut down.

Maybe you experienced this in school where you'd make the push to the end of the semester only to get sick over Christmas break. Once your body shuts down, it can being to heal whatever ails it.

Our brains are still on a pretty old operating system. Our brains are meant to have the capacity to handle the things that happen within our village or perhaps the next one over. Anything beyond that begins to extend our brains beyond what they're able to handle and we start to shut down.

I don't know about you, but I've sensed that this week in particular, our operating systems are shutting down quicker than usual.

We have the devastation of the earthquake in Haiti.

We have scenes of chaos in Afghanistan and central Asia.

Wildfires are burning. Droughts are more severe. And COVID cases continue to rise around our state and country.

It's too much.

And it's okay to say it. Our brains were not meant to be able to handle this much tragedy and anxiety.

Pastor Nadia gave some great advice to help get our circuit board back on track: we have to decide what is ours to care about and take action on that. Then we have to trust that there are others who are entrusted to care for everything else.

Some people may have connections to Afghanistan and the troops who served there and are able to help in that capacity. Some people may have family or connections in Haiti who are able to help there. We may have opportunities to help farmers negatively affected by drought up here in Minnesota in unique ways. We can all do what we can to mitigate the spread of COVID.

And then we trust that whatever we are unable to pick up, that there will be others there to take that mantle.

It's hard. It requires faith. It requires trust in God and in God's people.

But it's good news that God is at work more than we could ask, think, or imagine.

We trust that God is at work. Then we do what we can, where we are, with the resources and energy we have in trust that if we do that, the Spirit of God can work wonders in us.
