One of my favorite things about working at Bible Camp as a camp counselor was going on our camp out. We would hike a few miles out to the camp out sites -- usually nothing more than a fire ring, picnic table, and some space to set up our tents for the night.

While the counselors got ourselves organized, we'd send the campers around the site to gather sticks and twigs to make our fire for the night.

One of the things we noticed was that there were so many more sticks to come down after a storm. When it had been sunny all week, kindling was at a premium. It was very hard to find. But after a storm, the ground was covered with all kinds of branches of trees that had died off, but were still caught up there.

The storm didn't kill any of the branches, but it just shook loose and cleared away the dead branches that were lodged up there and weren't growing anymore.

I think the same is true for us.

When everything is going well for us, when the days are sunny and warm and there's not a cloud in the sky of our lives, we don't notice the parts of our lives that we may have outgrown or that doesn't have the same value it once did.

But it's when the storm comes that we hold fast to our strong roots and let the things that we have outgrown fall to the ground. We hold fast to our roots and to the places in us that still have the vibrant vitality of life, and it's in those parts that we find the strength to weather the storm.

My hunch is we've seen this in our lives in the last year and a half.

When crisis comes, there are life-giving things we do, and we lean into those to help us weather the storm. Maybe it's a spiritual practice (a prayer or meditation), maybe it's calling that one friend we can say anything to, maybe it's the simple practice of lying in our bed and taking a few extra deep breaths in the morning.

We have these practices that we do to help us stay connected to our roots and who we are as God's children. And when we do that, it's okay to let some of those other things that no longer serve us fall away.

We know that storms don't last forever.

We know that sunnier days lie ahead.

Riding the turbulent times out together - with Jesus at the center - is what makes us the church.

It's a blessing to be the church with you, no matter the weather.
