"Here I stand. I can do no other. God help me."

Over 500 years ago, Martin Luther defended himself with these words when he was put on trial for heresy and kicked out of the Roman Catholic Church. This led to the Protestant Reformation and the expansion of the church throughout the world.

This weekend we celebrate Reformation Sunday, the day when Martin Luther nailed his 95 Theses on the door of Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, which was the start of the Reformation.

One of the main reforms that Martin Luther advocated in these days was about the accessibility of The Bible.

Back in Luther's day, The Bible was only available in the original languages (Hebrew for the Old Testament, Greek for the New Testament) or in Latin, which only the Catholic priests would know how to read. The common person would have relied on others to read the Bible for them, because of this limited accessibility.

So when Martin Luther was in exile and hiding out from the church authorities, he translated the entire Bible into everyday German so people would be able to read it for themselves.

I love that this Sunday at Our Saviour's we'll get to celebrate our Bible milestone with our young people. It's a great reminder that the Bible holds the story of God's people and that we should all have access to those powerful stories and promises.

It's a great reminder for us that we are a part of the story in Scripture. We belong to that community of God's people who find ourselves in those pages -- each and every one of us.

We'll be grateful to celebrate this wideness of God's mercy, ever-expanding, ever-reforming this Sunday in worship.
