One of my favorite kids books to read with Lily and Milo is a book by author & illustrator Mo Willems called "Waiting is Not Easy."

In this book, Gerald the Elephant and Piggie the... Pig have to wait for a surprise to come, but guess what? It turns out that waiting is not easy.

I love it because as relatable as it is for a 7 and a 3 year old (who struggle with waiting plenty on their own), we can relate to it too, can't we? Waiting is not something that comes to us naturally.

There's a spirit that animates us that says "Go! Grab life by the horns! Make each day count! Carpe diem!" It's this cultural attitude that can tell us that waiting is actually a waste of time.

This is one of the reasons I love the season of Advent in the church. It's the dawning of a new church year.

And we start our new church year by... waiting.

As we move into Luke's gospel, it's comforting to know that we aren't the only ones who are waiting.

Zechariah and Elizabeth are waiting.

Mary is waiting.

Simeon and Anna are waiting.

The opening chapters of the gospel is the story of people waiting.

Throughout the Psalms, we hear an attitude of waiting: "My soul waits for the Lord. I count on his word. My soul is longing for the Lord more than a watchman for daybreak."

This song of waiting has reverberated throughout Israel's history, so Zechariah, Elizabeth, Mary, Simeon, and Anna have plenty of company in the ancestors in faith.

And so do we.

So I wonder....

What is something you are waiting for this Advent season?

How does it feel to wait?

The Jewish theologian Simone Weil says, "Waiting patiently in expectation is the foundation of the spiritual life."

Waiting patiently is difficult because our world is full of other, different, and competing messages. But when we can tune those messages out and hone in on what God is doing in this season, when we can listen to the stories of God's people waiting for the birth of Jesus, we can sense God's presence in our waiting too.

We can sense the steadfastness and faithfulness of God in this season as well.

Gerald and Piggie are right that waiting is not easy. But it is where we begin our Advent journey together.
