As we continue to move through what we in the church call Holy Week -- those days where we gather for worship to remember the last hours of Jesus' life, his death, and ultimately his resurrection -- there's one day that doesn't get the same kind of attention, but goes a long way to help us see the presence of God in our lives.

We call it Holy Saturday.

It's that day in between. The bad thing has already happened, and we haven't seen the fruit of new life that is on its way. So we live in between.

In the Scriptures, there's a gap on Saturday. We hear the heartbreaking, world-shaking story of Jesus dying on the cross, then the story goes right to Mary walking to the tomb on Sunday morning.

But what happened on Saturday?

My hunch is we probably know the answer to that question better than we may first assume. Because we spend most of our lives in continual Holy Saturdays.

Something bad happens in our life -- a loved one dies, we get a difficult diagnosis, relationships are strained or outright broken, a global pandemic throws the world upside down for years at a time -- and we don't quite know when the good news of resurrection will arrive.

So we wait and we hope.

I think that's probably what the disciples were doing too. They were in the upper room. Their lives had taken an unexpected and tragic turn. They didn't know the next right move.

And yet it was in their faithfulness in the waiting, that they discovered the empty tomb.

There was a group of women who didn't know what to do. So they did what they would when anyone in that time would die. They went to the tomb with spices to anoint the body of the one who died.

It was in their everyday faithfulness to the ritual aspects of life and faith that they discovered the good news that changed the world. The tomb was empty.

All of this is to say that if there is unresolved hurt or grief in your life, if there are things that didn't turn out how you wanted and you are still mourning those losses, know that there is a place in the church for you. Not only is there a place for you, but that this is a part of the journey of a faithful disciple because of what happens on Holy Saturday -- the day in between.
